AVIATION CORPS NEEDS MECHANICS

That America's air fleet is about to have exciting adventures is evidenced by the announcement that the Aviation Corps is in urgent need of 134 chauffeurs and motor-truck drivers, 3,562 auto and gas engine men, 1,360 machinists, 220 blacksmiths, forgers, 220 wheelwrights, 504 cabinetmakers, 460 sheet-metal workers and others to a total of 7,000 for service in France behind the lines.

They will belong to the "Motor Mechanics' Regiment," the first of its sort in American history. Only men outside the draft ages are acceptable under this call and they must be at least eighteen and not over forty.

There are also wanted for the same regiment 200 cooks, 100 canvas workers, 80 house and sign painters, 20 harness makers and 80 acetylene welders.
