

105 "BLUE DEVILS" ARE CHEERED BY GOTHAM CROWDS

Pershing's Boys and French Veterans Boost Liberty Loan Drive.

NEW YORK, April 30.—New York again paid enthusiastic tribute today to the 105 battle-scarred French "Polis," who arrived here unexpectedly yesterday to aid the Liberty Loan campaign. The fighters, who represent some of the crack corps of the French army, including the Alpine Chasseurs or "Blue Devils" marched to the City hall, where they were officially welcomed by Mayor Hylan.

Every "Polis" in the contingent is a veteran; all wear the cross De Guerre and some of them the cherished Cross of the Legion of Honor for conspicuous bravery on the battlefields of the Marne and Verdun.

Many of the soldiers are young peasants who have not even seen Paris, and they viewed the sights of New York, especially in the skyscraper district, with unfeigned astonishment and delight. Everywhere they were greeted with a tumultuous enthusiasm unusual for New York.

The presence of the Frenchmen and Pershing's veterans added impetus to the loan campaign here, which so far has proved disappointing. The district's total subscriptions at the close of business were \$564,190,000, which means that more than \$56,000,000 worth of bonds must be sold every day this week if the minimum quota of \$900,000,000 is to be attained.

Uncle Sam's Medals for Heroes

The medal of honor is the highest award of the United States government. It is presented in the name of congress for distinguished gallantry in battle or for heroism of an especially distinguished character not performed in the regular line of duty.

The distinguished service cross was recently authorized by order of the president. It is awarded to those who, since April 6, 1917, have distinguished

themselves by extraordinary heroism in connection with the military operations against an armed enemy of the United States under circumstances which do not justify the medal of honor. One hundred of these crosses have been shipped to France. Since these have been struck off, however, it has been decided to leave off the oak leaves, making the cross plain.

These medals, with their representative values, have their counterparts in the Victoria cross of Great Britain and the medal militaire and croix de guerre of France.

Asks Investigation of Von Tirpitz's Policy

AMSTERDAM, April 30.—In the current number of the Prussische Jahrbucher, Professor Hans Delbruck, German historian, accuses Admiral Von Tirpitz of lack of foresight during his term of office in the matter of construction of submarines.

"Von Tirpitz was fascinated with dreadnoughts," he says, "and even during the war hindered the construction of new submarines, in the belief that the few he had consented to build were sufficient to beat England in a few months."

Delbruck calls upon the reichstag to order an investigation into Von Tirpitz's naval policy.

Nephew of Wayne Man Wins Medal for Bravery

MILTON, Ind., April 30.—Charles Hale has been notified that his nephew, Claude Gilliam, who is serving with the British army in France, has been awarded the "distinguished conduct medal" for gallantry in action. The medal is the next highest honor which may be received by a non-commissioned officer in the English army. Gilliam was slightly wounded while in first line action on March 27.
