

BEEF RATIONS AGAIN, TO LAST UNTIL SEPT. 15

Plea is Made to Meet Needs of American and Allied Armies.

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 13.—To meet the needs of the American and allied armies and the civilian populations of France, Great Britain and Italy, the American people were asked by the food administration today to place themselves on a limited beef allowance from now until next Sept. 15.

Householders were requested not "under any circumstances" to buy more than one and one-quarter pounds of clear beef weekly, or one and one-half pounds, including the bone, for each person in the household.

Hotels and restaurants were asked not to serve boiled beef more than two meals weekly, beefsteak more than one meal weekly and roast beef more than one meal weekly.

"The demand for beef for our army, the armies of the allies and their civilian populations for this summer," said the food administration's announcement, "are beyond our present surplus. On the other hand, we have enough increased supply of pork this summer to permit economical expansion in its use. It, therefore, will be a direct service to our armies and the allies if our people will in some degree substitute fresh pork, bacon, ham and sausages for beef products."

French President Gets \$50 from U. S. Farmer

PARIS, June 13.—President Poincaré has received from an American farmer a letter containing \$50 and the explanation that the money, one-tenth of his worldly possessions, is to pay in part, the debt of the United States to General Lafayette. The president has formally notified the council of minister of the receipt of the letter and the money.

MAY COME TO U. S.

SATIN HAS VOGUE FOR SPORTS WEAR



John J. Younger

American motorists have been giving all their attention to going fast and none to stopping, declares John J. Younger, well known automobile engineer, now supervising engineering in the War Department's Motor Transport Division. "Get-away," "pick up," "dash" are familiar terms, he says, but nobody has been thinking of stopping. It is time to put on the brakes, he says.

Mr. Younger believes the national brake inspection movement, endorsed by traffic officials and leading motor experts the country over, will accomplish much good if it does nothing more than to call the attention of motorists to the importance of having their brakes inspected at regular intervals.

In fast rail traffic, says Mr. Younger, the question of stopping is always considered first. With a continuous stream of cars through the New York subway at rush hours, when Manhattan's millions are being carried to work and back home, experts point out that the subway engineers know to the fraction of a foot where the brakes are to be applied to bring their trains to a dead stop at a required point. Permanent signs are displayed and the subway cars stop so as to open in front of them. There would be a great amount of confusion, Mr. Younger thinks, if a similar string of automobiles attempted to stop at as frequent intervals as the subway trains.

Good Brake Lining Important

The importance of having automobiles equipped with good brake lining, as, for example, the kind that is thermoid hydraulic compressed and impervious to moisture, gasoline, oil and dust, is emphasized by the brake inspection movement. Many of the American cars now going to the front are equipped with the thermoid lining.

Automobile brakes, in the opinion of experts, should be as effective when applied by the woman driver as when applied by a strong man. A test was made recently in which a truck driver was found who could exert a pedal pressure of 400 pounds. No woman driver could do that, the experts say, yet, with a thermoid hydraulic compressed brake lining, a woman driver should be able to stop her car as quickly as the truck driver.

"MADE IN GERMANY" GLASSES TO AID U. S. AGAINST SUBS.

WASHINGTON, June 13.—From Chile there came today a pair of "made in Germany" binoculars to aid the navy in the war against the submarines. William Campbell, stevedore and ship chandler, of Iguaque, heard from an American vessel that marine glasses were very scarce and, although not an American citizen, forwarded to Chairman Hurley a fine pair as a token of appreciation for business given by United States ships.

7 DIRECTORS MAY OPERATE RAILROADS

WASHINGTON, June 13.—Seven directors, each managing all the roads in his territory and responsible to Director McAdoo as to questions of general policy, probably will operate the railroads of the U. S. under the present system of government control. This was indicated today with the publication of an announcement by Director General McAdoo, creating three additional operating regions, dividing the territory west of the Mississippi river. Lines east of the Mississippi had previously been divided into four districts and it was indicated today that no new region would be formed.

The new regions, their directors and the headquarters of the directors was announced as follows: Northern, R. H. Ashton, Chicago; Central, Hale Holden, president of the Burlington, Chicago; and Southwestern, B. F. Bush, receiver for the Missouri-Pacific, St. Louis. It was said a district manager will be named later for the Pacific coast.

Kerensky Trying to Reach France, He Says

A PACIFIC PORT, June 13.—A. Konovaloff, former Russian minister of Commerce, who is here on his way to Washington, London and Paris, said that former Premier Alexander Kerensky is on his way to France.

Konovaloff served as minister during Kerensky's administration and for a time was vice president of the cabinet. He was once vice-president of the duma during the Romanoff rule. "The last I heard from Kerensky was through an indirect source," he said today. "At that time he was in Norway and was trying to reach France."

WILL OUTLINE PLANS FOR AERIAL MAIL SERVICE


