

ZERO HOUR FOR U. S. IS COMING SPEAKERS URGE

Americans Must Prepare to go
Over With Loan as Men
Prepare to go Over Top.

Emphasis of the privilege, and not alone the duty of citizens of the United States to buy Liberty Bonds was the feature idea presented by Dr. J. J. Rae, Captain Roberts and Byram Robbins, Liberty Loan speakers, who spoke before a house of probably 250 enthusiastic people in Fountain City last evening. New Garden township workers reported at the meeting that over \$6,100 has already been subscribed to the fourth loan issue.

In opening Dr. Rae said, "Before we entered the war there were a great many people in the United States who were coming to the point where they actually believed that they could do as they pleased. We are now amenable to law, responsible to authority. A man who is not is a mighty dangerous commodity."

"Do you realize, when you read in the daily papers the news of the war that there are men back of it all—men enduring the dangers, the horror, the agonies that we never see? Those men want us to hear only the joy of victory and success, and they will never tell us all of what they have done so heroically and faithfully. Unless we provide the sinews of war our men can not exist."

Enemies Buy Bonds.

"Every day we give, every dollar we give is winning the war, is putting new impetus into our armies. The war is going to be decided by our loans. Put your dollars at the disposal of the government with a joy."

Captain Roberts emphasized the manner in which foreigners regard the value of United States war bonds.

"A few months ago I was in charge of a company of 300 or 400 men and out of that number there were 91 aliens, but I want you to know that those enemies bought Liberty Bonds in the loan campaign then going on, bought all they possibly could find money for, and they bought them without an unusual effort on any one's part—they bought them as a matter of course. When our enemies see thus it seems useless to urge our own people to make an investment which will mean the salvation of their country."

In closing Captain Roberts said, "With 4,000,000 men in our army we have done something, but with 15,000,000 we will begin to tell."

"As we stand and view the broad panorama of this war, it becomes a rare privilege to help the cause," said Attorney Byram Robbins. "As we view the past years we see Germany drilling for 40 years. We see the Prussian legions preparing while other countries were engaged in peaceful pursuits. Our president gave Germany the benefit of the doubt until he was convinced of the right in the matter. And now we are in the war and no matter what has come before; what you may have believed before; we must win."

The meeting was opened with a piano duet by Misses Neoma Pyle and Grace Brennan. The Liberty quartet rendered several numbers, and Miss Ruth Scott was enthusiastically received in violin numbers. She was accompanied by Miss Martha Scott. "Land of Mine" was sung by Rev. O. J. Livengood and choir and was well received. The Rev. Aaron Worth opened the meeting with a short prayer.

epithets and an additional waste of time to hurl them at the madman of Europe," said Rev. G. A. Burbanck, at the Cambridge City meeting. "Just as there exists no word in any language to describe the blackness of the Kaiser, so no language contains a word adequate enough to describe the greatness of our country, the beauty of our flag or the bravery of our men."

"The country is asked to lend the government, that is to say, the people are asking themselves to lend themselves four billions of dollars. Wayne county has been at bat three times and knocked a fly over the fence for a home run every time, and we can do it again."

"Our men are waiting in sight of German territory. American ammunition is falling on German soil it is only a question of time until the American flag will be waving from the Kaiser's castle. But we must keep the flow of money in Uncle Sam's pocket. It takes money, money, money, to supply our men with their needs."

"Our president made the mistake of distinguishing between the Kaiser and the German people, but subsequent events have shown that he was wrong. We must lick the Kaiser and his army and the German people."

No Time For Peace.

J. H. Bentley of the Richmond high school, said, "Germany is asking for peace. Of course Austria is asking for peace but we know who is really behind it. They do not expect peace. They do not expect Belgium to comply with their wishes. Germany is trying to apply the other side of her strategic pincers. One prong is the military side and she has failed in that and the other prong is the peace move. Does she want peace? No. If we were to quit now, giving Alsace-Lorraine to France and other territories to the countries to whom they belong Germany would still be winner."

"It is a fine thing that the Liberty Loan is on and the registration of men because it gives us something to do and shuts out all ideas of peace. We want to do everything we can to keep our peace talk."

"Our zero hour is coming. Are we going to talk peace? No. We don't even want to talk it in our sleep because that is what the Kaiser wants us to do."

"Germany is going to be whipped and she knows it but she is not whipped yet and her only hope is getting us to talk peace."

"Let us talk about going over in Liberty Bonds as the boys are going over: If we can buy one bond let us think how we can clean up enough money for two. The boys have shown their hands, now let us show ours."

The audience at Cambridge City was small but enthusiastic. The Cambridge City band furnished several musical numbers and the Victory quartet composed of Messrs. Funk, Graham, Mote and Luring sang several numbers.

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DRAFT REPORTS ARE COMING IN

WASHINGTON, Sept. 20—Complete returns on the recent draft registration from Illinois and Missouri were received yesterday by Provost Marshal General Crowder.

Illinois showed an actual registration of 846,275, compared with an estimate of 859,824. Missouri registered 421,056 against an estimate of 396,509. New York reported that the adjutant general's report being made up would show a total of 1,375,631 against an estimate of 1,345,457.

Serbian Prisoners Sold
as Slaves to Turkey

PARIS, Wed. Sept. 18.—The Serbian government is in possession of documents proving beyond possible question that thousands of Serbian prisoners have been sold as slaves for a specified period to Turkey by Bulgaria, Austria-Hungary and Germany, according to a Balkan dispatch from Corfu.

The prisoners, it is said, were delivered to contractors, who are engaged in work in Asia Minor and Anatolia. It is said they were subjected to terrible treatment and that thousands have died from typhus, cholera and hunger.

"Bombardment" of U. S.
Cities Told to Germans

NEW YORK, Sept. 20.—"Bombardment" of Washington, D. C. and Charleston, S. C., by a German submarine and the "terror" of Atlantic coast cities whose officials have "implored" the American government to protect them against a like fate is related as voracious news for German readers in a recent issue of the Cologne Gazette which has been received here.
