BOYS IN SERVICE GIVE GENEROUSLY TO FOURTH LOAN

In the following letter from Vogelsong he tells of the support which the Bluejackets at the Great Lakes are giving the fourth loan:

"Here is a record which I don't believe Wayne county could beat," he writes. "They are having the loan drive here as well as any place else, and in Company I, of the second regiment at Camp Dewey, \$7,200 was raised for the loan. A company you know, is composed of 144 men, and if I am not mistaken, there are only 100 men in this particular company. In this regiment, which has not yet been filled, there has been \$32,200 raised, which I think is a very good record, since there are only about 1,000 men in this regiment."
