

FOOD NEEDS OF RUMANIA FIRST RELIEF PROBLEM

Country Devastated by Germans and Austrians in Desperate Need of Relief.

(By Associated Press)

PARIS, Jan. 13.—At the first meeting of the International Food Commission here today will be considered a pressing appeal for food from the allied ministers in Rumania. The commission having absolute control of all food relief, the ministers have turned to it to avert what they say will be a most disastrous situation if Rumania is not fed.

On January 2, the ministers sent the following telegram from Jassy:

"Situation becomes more and more alarming. If the allies do not better it with the least possible delay and in the meantime do not immediately announce their measures of execution, trouble yet more serious than that of last week will occur."

"Notwithstanding the satisfaction given to national sentiment, the people, who are dying of hunger, cast back upon the allies, from whom they await immediate relief, the responsibility for their extreme misery.

In Total Isolation.

Rumania, after having been entirely devastated by the Germans and Russians, is the only one of the allied countries finding time for fifteen months in total isolation. It could not, like Belgium, be regularly revailed during the occupation. We insist in the most pressing manner, in the name of humanity, as well as for our political and economic interests in this country, that with no avoidable delay an amount in advance of the rations to be apportioned to Rumania be sent her.

"We call attention to the absolute necessity for not continuing the delay that has deferred during the last year the effective opening of credits, which was earnestly demanded in August, accorded immediately in principle, but not realized up until the end of December. It goes without saying that it is now a question of opening credits, but of immediately sending food supplies, payment for which will be arranged for after receipt."

The Earl of Reading and Sir John Bell will represent Great Britain on the commission while Etienne Clemenceau and M. Vilgrain will be the French members. Italy has so far failed to announce her representatives.

Waterplane Saved Many Lives in British Navy

LONDON, Jan. 13.—A device which for more than three years helped to protect British warships from German mines has won for its inventor, Lieutenant Charles D. Burney, of the British navy, the order of Companion of St. Michael and St. George, and a grant of \$150,000. The invention is said to have saved the lives of hundreds of sailors and prevented the loss of many warships. It consists of a waterplane shaped like a torpedo, having a pair of large flat fins projecting on either side. It is towed overside by a wire rope in such a way that it runs from the ship's bows outward. The wire rope is intended to pick up the mooring ropes of mines and slide them along until they reach to the noose of the device, where a sharp saw is fixed inside a V-shaped slot. The saw cuts through the mooring rope and allows the mine to float free, where it can either be avoided or destroyed.

The invention is known in the service as the "P. V." or paravane."

Automobile Notes

An interesting story comes from the Pacific Motor Company of Hong Kong, China.

A Nash Six has just been purchased from this firm by a high official of the Chinese government for use in Canton, China. It will be the first motor car used in this famous old Chinese city of a million and a quarter people.

In the entire Canton district there is only one road which would serve for motoring, and it is but three miles in length. All hauling and delivering is done by coolies who are glad to work for five to ten cents a day. Thousands of these coolies swarm everywhere; carrying loads of every conceivable kind. There are no streets, as we know them, in Canton, but instead, narrow alleys between the buildings twisting in and out in an endless maze.

Outside the walls of the city itself, there are huge burying grounds which are carefully kept in order by the natives. The native Chinese worships his ancestors, and it would be looked upon as sacrilegious to disturb any of these thousands of graves which entirely surround the city for the purpose of road building. Then, too, the wealthy, or well-to-do class in Canton is very small, and they can well afford to hire their hauling and delivering done by the capable and easily satisfied coolie.

This condition, however, does not exist in the treaty ports of Hong Kong, Shanghai, Tienstin and Hankow, where the large European and American colonies have built up modern sections for themselves, and have created a demand for every modern convenience.

The Far East is rapidly developing into a good market not only for passenger cars, but for trucks and commercial cars as well. Two Nash Quads have recently been purchased by the Chinese government for service at the Kiangnan arsenal. These orders were placed after a visit to the plant at Kenosha, Wis., by the Chinese government commission. Two delegations from Japan have also recently made a visit to the big Nash factory. There are several Nash Sixes at Penang and Singapore in the Straits settlements, as well as three Nash trucks, and Java is using Quads for government work.
