

FINAL ACTION IS TAKEN FOR GENERAL CLUB

Domestic Science Club Votes to Enlarge into Departmental Organization.

A woman's departmental club was formed in Richmond Wednesday afternoon when the Domestic Science club voted to enlarge itself into such an organization. The Domestic Science organization will be a nucleus around which will be formed a departmental club.

Mrs. Paul Comstock was made president of the new club with power to take action and appoint committees. She will appoint a committee to draw up a new constitution and by-laws which will be presented to the new organization in two or three weeks. When this meeting is called it will be open to all women interested in the new organization. A large mass meeting will be called probably in May to elect new officers and committees for the new body. Until that time the present officers of the Domestic Science club will act. At that time they have all consented to resign. Those persons most interested in the departmental club are hoping to include in this organization the Music Study club and the Art association. Five departments are being planned for: music, literature, art, household economics and civics. The Music Study club would be the nucleus of the music department, the art association for the art and the Domestic Science for the household economics. At first it is probable that the civic department will come under the household economics department until it can be developed. A literary society would have to be formed.

Clubs to Retain Identity.

There is no literary society in Richmond which could be called such. There are clubs which deal with literary topics but are more social than literary. A new department would have to be formed which would deal exclusively with literature. People who have literary inclination could help and information form this department.

The old clubs in Richmond which have been in existence for years and which are more or less exclusive are not expected to drop their identity and join the departmental club, as a club, but the members will be expected to take an interest in the new club.

No present club in Richmond is large enough to back any civic movement or any other kind of movement. This club will be strongest in its membership and will have more influence. It is hoped that there will be a great many women who are not now a member of any club will join this new club which offers a far larger field of activity to the small club woman or the woman who is not a club woman at all.


Membership Qualifications.

After the constitution and by-laws are completed and accepted by the organization there are two important questions to be discussed and settled. They are the dues and the membership.

Membership qualifications are that a woman has ordinary intelligence.

The question would be whether a member must belong to some department in order to be an active member of the club or whether she can belong to the club and not to a specific department and be an active member.

The question of dues is an important one. Two clubs have been taken as examples, one at Greensburg, Ind., a small town, and one at Toledo, Ohio. In Greensburg a woman paid a small dues to be a member of the club and in addition to this a small fee was charged in each department whose needs would some financial backing. In the Toledo club the membership was large and dues in the general club entitled the member to every-

thing with no additional fee in any department.

At the meeting held three weeks ago when the women voted unanimously for the department club, and at the meeting Wednesday it was suggested that when a woman counts the dues she pays in several organizations they do not amount to more than she would pay in the Woman's club which would give her all and more than she got in all her other societies.

Mrs. Comstock said Wednesday that there would be difficulties to encounter, but which would be worth while when the new Woman's department club is completely organized.

This is a matter of vital importance to all the women of Richmond and all are urged to watch the papers for the announcement of the mass meeting.

Preceding the business session of the Domestic Science club, Wednesday, Bernhard Knollenberg talked on Hawaii. He spoke on the food, the living conditions, the servant problem and the physical wonders of Hawaii.

There are a great supply of servants in Hawaii, he said, because of the Oriental population. The Oriental women live in huts which do not take much care. They work and are willing to spend their whole days out. Also the Japs and Chinese are very good cooks. They work for small wages, and if treated well are exceedingly loyal.

Knollenberg said that life in Honolulu is as pleasant as one could expect to find any place. Professional men work eight hours and business men work from eight to twelve. One thing that is necessary in the island is exercise and everyone takes it.

Mr. Knollenberg described the grandeur of the scenery on the islands, with its beautiful colorings. He advised any one going to the Hawaiian islands not to spend all his time on the beaches but to see some of the beauties of the islands.

Five Hundred Will Attend Eaton Lincoln Banquet

Decoration of the banquet hall was begun this morning, under supervision of E. E. Bailey. The banquet will be served promptly at 6:30 o'clock. Mrs. Fredricka Acton, local cateress, will serve the menu, which will consist of roast turkey and all that goes with it.

The speakers at the banquet include Congressman-elect R. Clinton Cole, of Findlay; Representative C. H. Freeman, Ada; Dr. L. C. Weimer, Dayton, and Harry D. Silver, Preble county representative. Mayor Harry Risinger will be master of ceremonies and C. R. Coblenz of New Paris, will be toastmaster.

Prominent Republicans who have accepted invitations to the feast include E. G. Burkam, editor of the Dayton Journal; E. M. Fullington, chairman of the Republican state committee; C. D. Brower, chairman of the Montgomery

county Republican committee, and W. O. Gord, president of the Union League Club, of Dayton.

Mayor Harry Risinger will head a reception committee of twelve, that will welcome the out-of-town guests.


