

ACCIDENTAL SHOT CAUSES BOY'S DEATH

CAMPBELLSTOWN, O., June 12.—A verdict of accidental death was returned by the coroner of Preble county after his inquest into the death of Clifford Gebhart, 14 years old, who was found in his brother's room with a bullet wound in his body Thursday afternoon.

Young Gebhart had been playing with his sister and had gone to the room to dress for expected guests. He locked the door in order to avoid being disturbed, and when the family heard the shot entrance was not gained until a ladder was put to a window.

The boy had evidently found his brother's revolver on a table, and had discharged the gun while examining it. The bullet entered his body just below the heart. He was in the eighth grade, and was well-liked. The parents, three sisters, Dorothy, Virgie and Ethel, and his brother, Lester, survive. Funeral arrangements have not been made.

Barn Near Eaton Is Struck By Lightning

EATON, O., June 12.—A barn on the farm of Martin Fowler, living six miles north of Eaton, was destroyed by fire after being struck by lightning about 3 o'clock Thursday afternoon.

The stock was saved, but Fowler's hay and other feed was destroyed. The loss is between \$1,800 and \$2,000, with about \$200 insurance.

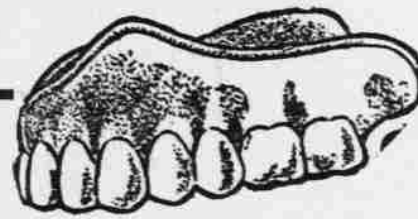
