

ONE BIG ROUND BEATS REDS; GO TO N. Y. TODAY

Paulette's Homer in Seventh
Too Much for Leaders—
Eller Pitches Poorly.

CINCINNATI, Aug. 12.—One big round, and the Phillies proved to the Reds that even second division teams can win ball games once in a while, the Reds losing the final contest to Philadelphia on the home lot Monday afternoon, 5 to 3.

The five juicy counters all came in the same round, and were the undoing of Hod Eller, who had been placed on the mound to give the Reds a six game lead in the league race. Hod's work was far from excellent at any time during the contest, but with high class support he managed to hold the Phillies in check for six seasons, while the Reds were tapping Eppa Rixey for three tallies.

But the seventh session proved too much for Hod, and after he had crowded the bases to overflowing and allowed one man to cross the pan, Gene Paulette finished the contest with a circuit drive to right field, which drove in four runners and closed the game with the Phillies on top.

Six Games in 3 Days.
Monday's game was the final contest of the Reds at home until September, and they left last night for the east, where they open Wednesday with a six game series against the Giants. On the outcome of these contests, depends largely the Reds' chances of sharing in the world series.

All six of the Giant-Red series in New York will be double bills, only three days being allotted to the contests, half of which were played over from the last series, when rain prevented all but one of the games.

In spite of the fact that the Giants look better on paper, the Reds are being given credit for a better chance to cop, by most baseball writers. Their performance during the last home stay, when they stepped from second place to first with a five game lead, has caused all of the league fans to sit up and take notice, and the fans are expecting the Reds to show up as well as the Giants in their eastern series, which will mean that they come back to Cincinnati with the top of the league still in their possession.

On top of the exciting series in the east, the Reds still have an advantage of playing five less games than the Giants during the remainder of the series, unless the Giants cop all of these games their efforts will be of great benefit to the Reds.

TEAMS FROM EAST WIN IN WEST; REDS ONLY TAKE SERIES

The eastern clubs as a whole outplayed their western rivals in the intersectional contests that came to a close in the west with Monday's games. Out of a total of 51 combats played, the east captured 26 to 25 for the west.

The Reds went at a fast clip at home, winning 11 and losing only four. They did not lose a single series to an eastern rival. Moran's men walked the Braves four out of five. They took two out of three from the Giants and the same number from the Trolley Dodgers. As for the Phillies, the Reds made it three out of four from Gavvy Cravath's bunch.

The Cubs were unable to do much with the Braves, Dodgers or Phillies, but they earned an even break in twelve games by defeating the Giants three straight. The Pirates won five and lost seven. The Cardinals had a sad time of it, coping but three and dropping nine.

Phillies Go Fine.
Despite the drubbing they took at Cincinnati, the Phillies featured the intersectional battles by their surprisingly good work. They took part in an even dozen games, winning eight and losing but four. The Braves, after getting a bad start against the Reds, picked up and traveled at a good gait, finishing with seven victories against six defeats. The Trolley Dodgers won six and lost seven.

It was the naughty Giants who made the poorest showing among the eastern clubs. McGraw's band won a single series in the west, beating the Pirates three out of five. Out of the fourteen games they played the Giants won five and dropped nine.

POWER LINE FROM CONNERSVILLE TO CAMBRIDGE, PLAN

A high power line from Connersville to Cambridge City, is the nucleus of the plans just completed by E. D. Johnston, president of the Hydro-Electric Light and Power Company, of Connersville. It has been predicted that the new Cambridge City line will finally become a trunk line, but officials would not say.

A petition has already been filed with the state Public Service Commission and it will be but only a short time before the company will receive an order from the commission directing them to begin the work, which is expected to be completed by the latter part of fall.

The new line to Cambridge City will be more powerful and larger and greater care will be used in its construction, while the total cost has been estimated at twenty-five thousand dollars. It has not yet been decided whether the route will be up the Milton road as the old one, or whether the line will come straight through regardless of highways. This decision will be reached shortly.
