T.B. IS FOUND IN DAIRY, REPORT TO COUNCIL TO SHOW

One Wayne county dairy has been put out of business, 12 cows and one bull having been killed because they were infected with tuberculosis, 45 were visited and found in good shape, and 14 milk depots were visited by Dairy Inspector Joseph R. Edwards, according to his report for July which will be submitted to council at its regular meeting Monday evening.

Milk depots visited by Edwards and the condition in which they were found are as follows: R. J. Haas, good; Dairy Produce company, fair; Himes Brothers, fair; C. L. Pitts, good; Henry Goble, good; John Wuerker, good; George Kircher, good; Fred Bliekwedel, good; John Madden, fair; Howard Hoover, fair; Bert Davenport, fair; and stock yards, good.

Twenty-one weights and measures were adjusted, 26 condemned, 2 confiscated, and 23 reinspected, according to the July report of W. A. Hunt, weight and measures inspector, whose report will be given to council.

The ordinance making a reappropriation of \$5,000 for the purchase of the city gravel pit will be read on third reading and one for the improvement of Fourth and Fort Wayne Avenue will be up on second reading.

Two ordinances, one to be read on third reading and one on second reading will be introduced at council, Monday evening. The report of Reid Memorial hospital will be read.

A recommendation for the Board of Works that the ordinance committee frame new traffic rules, suggesting that persons passing east and west be given right of way, will be submitted for action of the council.

RISE IN RENTS IS JUSTIFIED, SAYS REAL ESTATE MAN

Richmond still has a very serious problem in her housing facilities. Practically no houses are for rent, and the few that are, are not modern and lay in the remote sections of the city, according to local real estate dealers. Up-to-date houses put on sale are snapped right up at enormous prices they say.

Numerous inquiry from out of town people, who would like to locate in Richmond, for rental houses have been turned down, for lack of housing facilities, as a result, Richmond loses many desirable residents.

Real estate men believe that the recent rise in rents is justified, pointing out that taxes have increased in proportion to all other articles and that real estate owners have to pay the same prices as the rest of the public.

Rents haven't risen as high here as in other cities of this size, and are predicted not to drop lower with other prices, for the reason that the landlord was not getting a sufficient amount before the rise, to keep his houses in repair, it was said.

ARMY SUPPLY SALE IS STARTED TODAY

WASHINGTON, Aug. 18.—Parcel post sale of the vast surplus supply of foodstuffs which the war department is putting on the market was inaugurated today with every postmaster in the country furnished with a price list from which the consumer may order. Individuals will order directly from their postmaster who in turn will base his requisitions upon the war department on the volume of foodstuffs ordered.

For each of the seventy articles of food offered the price list shows the price per can or individual unit as well as the price per case or larger container. The gross weight of each package also is shown in order that the purchaser may compute the price he will have to pay by adding the parcel post rate from the nearest distributing point. The foodstuffs have been distributed in each of the thirteen war department subsistence districts in proportion to population, the prices quoted being f.o.b. storage points in those districts.

Trees Necessity, Says City Engineer, Advises Neighborhood Clubs to Plant and Care for Them

It has been said that a city is known and remembered by the number and beauty of its shade trees. Nothing is so attractive as a street lined on either side with beautiful trees. Richmond has many, but she has not enough.

The benefit to be derived by planting shade trees was well appreciated by our earlier citizens. Our thoroughfares show many shade trees of which we are now very proud. Only some of the newer additions to the city do not have shade trees planted along their streets.

Many citizens become discouraged about planting trees, for when they attain a certain size they are often unduly cut by linemen to allow wires to pass through. Or upon repeated planting, the trees die prematurely.

If you have difficulties, seek the advice of an expert nurseryman. It is one of the requisites of good citizenship to keep trees planted about your home.

Need Much Care.

Trees need care and attention or they become liable to attack by insects or disease. Recently forty trees in Richmond were reported by the police to be dead, and their removal ordered. Will forty new trees be planted in their places this fall? It is doubtful, but they should be.

Among the numerous varieties of trees to choose from are the Oriental Pine, Ash, Maple, American Elm and Birch, all of which make delightful shade and are well suited to our climate.

It is best to plant shade trees about thirty feet apart, as nurserymen say it requires that distance to give their branches space to spread. In many places in Richmond the trees are planted too close together. Instructions on planting can be obtained from any nurseryman's catalogue.

Should Be Cared For

After shade trees are planted, they are often times left to themselves to grow the best way they can. They should be well trimmed and all dead

branches cut away; if scale or insects are noticed the tree should be sprayed in order to bring it back to a healthy condition. In cutting away limbs, care should be used to have them cut close to the main branch and the end painted with pine tar. Also in case of a bruise, pine tar prevents ants eating into the tree.

An ideal method to handle our tree troubles would be to form a neighborhood club in each block the necessary equipment to spray and trim the trees and would create a greater interest both in trees and neighbors.

GREATER STRENGTH IN ARMY IS URGED BY WAR SECRETARY

WASHINGTON, Aug. 18.—Calling attention to the "disturbed state of the world at present," Secretary Baker told a Senate military sub-committee today that he would not be doing his part unless he urged upon Congress to provide for an army that would "represent the strength of the United States." The committee is considering the war department plan for a standing army of 567,000 men and universal military training.

Mr. Baker said the nation's military policy must be modified as a result of the experiences gained in this war, not only in the organization of the war department but also in the organization of the army so as to bring about greater co-ordination.
