

REDS COME FROM BEHIND AND WIN FROM BRAVES, 7-6

Who Will Pitch Friday? Four Men Used Against Braves on Thursday's Game.

 BOSTON, Mass., Aug. 22.—After raising the Braves' hopes by handing them a four-run lead Pat Moran's crowd of champions turned right around and won. The final score was 7 to 6, and it took the Reds the full nine innings to collect their side of the count.

Slim Sallee started to hold the Braves but the first ball he pitched was knocked to the right field fence for the circuit. The Braves collected four hits of the Slender sheriff in two rounds, including a triple and a home run. Ray Fisher next took the bat, and had it not been for a brace of errors by Rath in the fifth inning, the Braves' scoring would have been done. Rath bobbled two in the fifth round, and allowed two runs to score. Luque pitched the seventh and eighth innings, after a pinch hitter had gone in for Fisher, and he gets the credit for the game.

Batted Like Sledgehammers.
 The head of the Red batting order started its sledgehammer batting tactics again, and the combination of Groh, Daubert, Roush and Neale, following Morris Rath, just slipped the horseshoe into all corners of the lot, totalling twelve safe bingles. Four of the twelve were for three bases, Greasy Neale leading the list with a pair of triples.

After yesterday's victory, in which Manager Moran used four pitchers, the Reds are rather hard up for a slaban Friday. Sallee, Elmer and Luque played but one inning in Thursday's game, and Manager Moran may send one of them back today.

Sallee had plenty of rest, but didn't get started right, so he may have the chance today. Jimmie Ring is ready to pitch, but Pat is trying to save him for the opener against the Phillies Saturday. Ring has always been effective against the Phils, and for this reason Moran wants to start him in Saturday's contest.

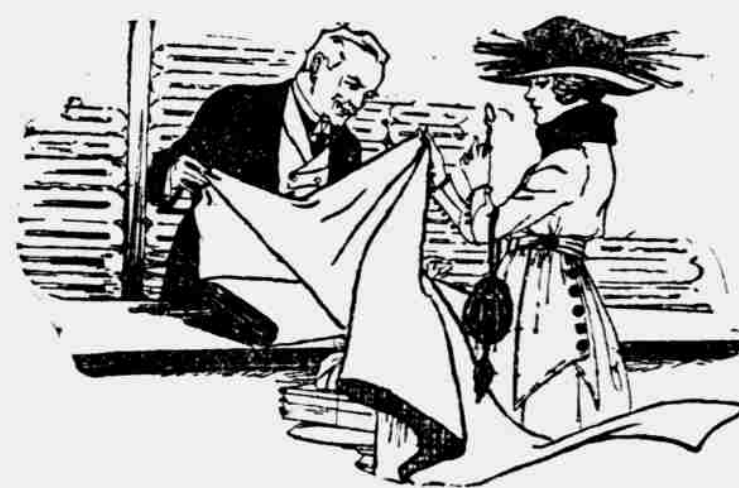
