CHICAGO, Aug. 22.—The grain market is slow. Locals bullish but the food investigations are too unsettling.

Europe appears to be preparing for large wheat imports but export oats demand is flabby.

Corn bulls are afraid Texas will continue to cut northern cash corn prices.

Offerings as reported are a weight. Chicago cash corn above \$1.90. Canadian oats crop is guessed at around three hundred million but statistics are not a factor. Outside buying is checked by United States desire to

cut food costs and keep labor quiet. Farmers will see big fall wheat acreage. Corn crop looks about 2,850 million.
