

## IF REDS PLAY .750 BALL THEY WILL WIN FLAG

If They Break Even, Giants  
Must Win Twenty-four and  
Lose Five.

YORK, Pa., Aug. 29.—With Heinle Groh at the head of the team, the Cincinnati Reds won favor in the hearts of the local baseball fans here Thursday afternoon, in spite of the fact that they defeated a local semi-pro team, 8 to 1.

Groh's custom of putting in the entire regular line-up to start the game, and allowing them to play three or four innings before sticking in substitutes, has been very pleasing.

Following New York's dismal defeat Thursday afternoon at Philadelphia, the Reds are now in the same relative position with New York as they were when they started on their three day layoff Wednesday. With a full nine game lead, and the team playing in true championship style, it will have to win only three fourths of the remaining games to clinch, no matter what kind of a support the Giants take.

If the Reds win 19 more games this season, there can be no possible chance for the Giants to overtake them. With only 29 more games to play, the Giants have already lost 41, whereas the Reds, by losing six of their remaining 25 games, will be a full game ahead of New York at the end of the season.

## WORLD THOUGHT IS NEED, SAYS J. ADAM BEDE, HUMORIST

"The greatest thing we need to do is to stop thinking in units, but to think instead in nations and continents," said J. Adam Bede before the chautauqua audience Thursday evening. He added, "Only by doing this can we reach our real problems."

Bede is an acrobat of language. He verily has his whole delegation holding its sides from beginning to end.

A lot of people remembered that when Mr. Bede was in congress, he was the wit lugger.

Don't Like Daylight Saving. He discussed the time troubles of the North Dakotans, with time and the daylight saving law.

"Why, out there they have to get up in the middle of the night to do the milking, in fact they have to have their cows and chickens wear alarm clocks, for they never dream it was time for milking according to the appearance of the place where the sun ought to be.

Then about the middle of the afternoon, according to the sun, they have to do milking again. And some of the hens out there have been so discussed with such long afternoons that they have actually begun laying for the next day. Then some folks can't see how it makes any difference to the farmer."

Now the trouble with the whole thing was that when the daylight saving law was made they neglected to make a law prohibiting the dew to remain on after it was time for farmers to get up. If they had just done that it would have cleared up the whole situation."

Make World Better. "The only world fit to live in, is a world that we can make a little better and then make it stay that way," was one of Mr. Bede's typical statements.

The former congressman, through a little play of logic showed his audience that the lifting of every problem from off the earth has as a rule brought forth a new problem. He pointed to the race problem, an outgrowth of the killing of slavery.

"When we had slaves bound in the shackles of their servitude we had no race problem," he said. "But when slavery was killed we began to have a problem which today is one of our greatest. If not our greatest—that of race prejudice, and the end of it we can not see."

"Does this mean that we should put the negro back into his slave garments, or that we should join in crushing this problem?"

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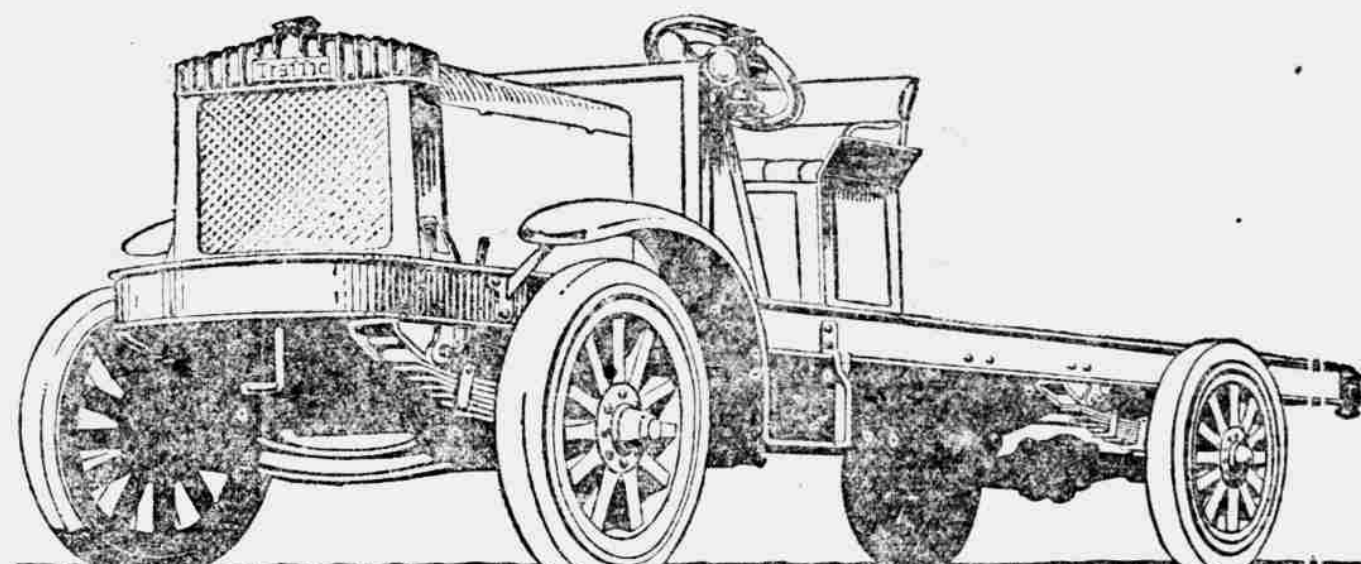
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
