General Gorgas to Clean Up Ecuador

GUAYAQUIL, Ecuador, Aug. 28.—Major General William C. Gorgas, former surgeon general of the United States army, who has been investigating sanitary conditions in Central and South America, has offered to assume technical direction of the sanitation of Guayaquil if money for the work is supplied by the municipality or the government of the republic, it was announced today.

General Gorgas, at the request of the Peruvian authorities will proceed to Piura, 210 miles from Guayaquil, which is infected with yellow fever.

War Savings Stamps Are Cashed; Hold 'Em! Advice

James Hoover was fined \$1 and costs by Mayor Zimmerman in police court, Friday on charges of assault and battery.


GRAPE PRICES CUT
