

INVESTIGATION OF OMAHA RIOT CAUSES ARRESTS

More Than Seventy-five Persons Arrested for Sunday's Event.

OMAHA, Neb., Oct. 3.—Governor McKelvie, assisted by state agents to day continued his investigation into the causes of the riots last Sunday which resulted in the lynching of a negro, an attack by the mob of the mayor of Omaha, the killing of two white men and the burning of the county court house.

More than seventy-five men and boys are under arrest, charged with participating in the riots and the police say many others will be taken into custody.

Major-General Leonard Wood, who has been in personal command since Monday of the federal troops sent here to preserve order, planned to leave for Chicago tonight. He said conditions were such that the troops now on duty would be gradually relieved, although forces stationed at Forts Omaha and Crook would be strengthened and trained for riot duty.

The negro suspect arrested after the attack on a white woman on Wednesday on the border of the "black belt" was released by order of the military forces.

In response to recommendations of General Wood the city council authorized the employment of one hundred additional policemen and standardized equipment including two machine guns, thirty riot guns, automobiles and motorcycles for emergency use.

Make Own Christmas Toys in Detroit

With the high cost of living engrossing attention, grownups are apt to forget that youngsters are sadly affected by the high cost of playing. Due to unusually high prices of wooden toys, many children are forced to do without the luxury of a little red wagon and all the wooden toys of toyland. It is to combat this evil that a course in toy making has been added to the manual training work at Northern High Evening School.

This course is open to both men and women, so that fathers and mothers who wish to, may learn the art of carving toys and decorating them attractively. Such toys as wagons and wheelbarrows, turtles that crawl, parrots that nod and chickens and ducks on rollers, can be made at small cost. One object of the toymaking class

is to make a supply for Christmas. Such toys as are made for that purpose will be distributed among the children who might be overlooked in the general rush of the holiday season.

Besides toymaking, the evening woodwork courses will include special instructions for women in making accessories for the home, such as pattern blocks for designs, book ends, crumb trays and picture frames.

For men who are interested in the more advanced and commercial work courses will be given in pattern making and wood turning by machine


