

WORKMEN STAGE SAFETY DRIVE ON RAILROADS

All possible steps are being taken by the railroads here, to impress upon their employees the necessity of keeping down accidents.

Posters and notices reminding them of the National Railroad Accident Prevention Drive, October 18 to the 31, are placed on all bulletin boards, offices and similar places where they will attract the attention of the railroaders.

F. J. Stimson, chairman of the Richmond division safety committee, is issuing a safety badge to each employee and a bulletin showing the standing of the local division is posted every 24 hours. A reminder is placed on the bulletins, which says: "Chances travel upon crutches. Do you want to travel that way?"

Engineers are even decorating their mounts with various inscriptions, calling attention to the drive, which has never before been attempted on such a large scale. Shopmen, trainmen, armen, and all others connected with a railroad, have pledged themselves to do all in their power to prevent accident, and special inspection of all yards, shops, and the like, have been made to make sure that no unsafe conditions exist.

American Energy, With Soap and Water Defeats Serbian Typhus Epidemic

(By Associated Press)

BELGRADE, Serbia, Oct. 24.—American physicians and Red Cross workers conquered the typhus epidemic in Serbia, by using soap, scrubbing brushes, kerosene, disinfectants and delousing machines, says Lieutenant Colonel Edgar Erskine Hume, of Frankfort, Kentucky, director of the American Red Cross here.

"We went into the homes of people and carried the patients out," said Hume. "At times they were reluctant to leave and we had a hard task overcoming fatalism. Often we had to use force. We cleaned them, scrubbed them and literally turned the bone on them."

"Until an effective serum is found, the most potent agent in combating the disease is soap and water. Mix this with American energy and enthusiasm and you have a combination that will check, if not overcome, any disease that has its origin in dirt."

AVEZZANO ACCEPTABLE TO U. S. GOVERNMENT

WASHINGON, Oct. 24.—Baron Romano Avezzano, who recently was selected to relieve, as Italian ambassador to the United States, Count V. Macchi de Cellere, who died here last night, will be acceptable to the United States government, and the Italian government has been so informed, it was announced at the state department Tuesday.

SUPREME COUNCIL DEMANDS 5 MORE GERMAN VESSELS

WASHINGTON, Oct. 24.—Demand is made on Germany by the supreme war council in a note, the text of which has not been made public, for delivery forthwith of 5 former German vessels, which have not been turned over under the treaty on the pretense that the ships having been sold in 1915 and 1916, by the Hamburg-American line and Kosmos line to Dutch shipping companies, were consequently not German built Dutch ships.

The ships concerned are the Johann Heinrich Burchard, William Oswald, Brunschweig, Denrath and Nassau.


