

## DOCTORS DO NOT EXPECT INFLUENZA; GIVE DIRECTIONS

Several doctors at the Union County Medical association Thursday, said they did not believe another such epidemic as last year's influenza visit this country, during their time.

Dr. J. N. Study, of Cambridge City, read a paper on the disease. He said that not one death occurred out of all the cases suffered in that town. The doctor explained some of the remedies he administered.

"The first thing to do when a patient feels ill with influenza symptoms is to go to bed in a room where there is plenty of fresh air, at the temperature of about 65 degrees. Overdressing with cold preparations should be avoided. A warm bath before getting in to bed gives added relief," said Dr. Study.

He also emphasized the importance of isolation of patients, producing "flu" symptoms and discrediting the use of vaccines, which he said he had not seen successfully used.

"Diagnosis is the first thing in the medical profession today," said Dr. W. H. Haines, of the surgical staff of Cincinnati University. Dr. Haines' paper was on "Surgical Disorders and the Digestion."

Dr. Charles P. Emerson, of Indianapolis, read a paper on Psychasthenic sufferers from imaginative delusions regarding his case.
