EATON, O., Jan. 19.—Governors James M. Cox, Judge George W. Mannix, Greenville, and Judge Robert Marx, Cincinnati, captain in the military service during the late war, are announced as the speakers for the annual Jackson banquet, which will be given in Eaton the evening of Jan. 29, by the Democracy of Preble county. This will mark the fourth meeting of its nature held in Preble county this winter under supervision of the state university. The fifth and last meeting will be held in West Elkton, February 13-14.
