

## REAPPRAISEMENT IN PREBLE IS REJECTED BY OHIO TAX MEN

EATON, O., Jan. 31.—As a result of persistent activity of the state tax commission looking to a reappraisal of real estate in Ohio, County Auditor S. C. Hunt recommended to the county commissioners that reappraisal of realty in Preble county be made. The commissioners have gone on record as disapproving reappraisal.

The auditor takes the view that the buck is now passed to the state tax commission. In his recommendation the auditor declared in several of the taxing districts of the county realty is not entered upon the tax duplicate at its real value.

**Sues to Set Aside Deed.**  
Suits to set aside a deed to property in New Paris has been filed in common pleas court by C. M. Jaqua, Sadie Hapner and Pearl Davis against Elmer Daugherty. Plaintiffs claim through undue influence and fraud Daugherty procured from their mother Ann Malena Daugherty, a deed to the property in question, at which time they claim she was 75 years old, had been ill and feeble and did not know what she was doing when she executed the deed.

**Sues for Divorce.**  
Following their marriage Oct. 13, 1918, at the Navy Yards, New York, Ada Shelley is suing Joseph E. Shelley for divorce and custody of their daughter, Mary, whose age is given as about 2 years. She claims her husband returned from overseas in July, 1919, and was mustered out of service, but that he refused to return to her.

**Seeks Land Partition.**  
As a son and heir-at-law of the late Wilson F. Howell, Orville Howell seeks partition of 85 acres of land in Monroe township and lot 34 in West Manchester. He claims a one-eighth interest in the realty.

**Asks Half Interest.**  
Mary Hunt, as a daughter and heir-at-law of the late Jennie Brenner, seeks to have set off to her an alleged half interest in lot 489 in Lewisburg.

**Funeral Services Held.**  
Funeral services for Arthur Earman, 34, farmer, who died Sunday at his home, two miles northwest of Eaton, a few hours after his arrival home from a hospital in Dayton, where he had been under treatment, were held here Friday afternoon at the Universalist church, with Rev. Thomas Murray in charge, followed by burial in Mound Hill cemetery. The funeral was delayed until the arrival of a brother from the west. The wife, one daughter, parents and several brothers and sisters survive the decedent.

**Landowners Excited.**  
Landowners affected by a proposed state-county improvement of the Eaton-Camden pike, south of Eaton, are considerably perturbed over the widely circulated mis-information that their assessments will be 60 per cent of the entire cost of the improvement. County Auditor S. C. Hunt states that the state highway department will pay 40 per cent of the total cost, the county, township and land owners the remaining 60 per cent of which the land owners' share will probably be slightly in excess of 10 per cent, which figure has prevailed heretofore.

Of the Republicans, Watson leads with 47. Wood is second with 43, Johnson has 26, Lowden 9, Goodrich 13, Harding 6, Coolidge 4. Democrats are Edwards 119, Wilson 23, Bryan 6, McAdoo 21, Cox 6.
