

## AMERICAN LEAGUE FIGHT ENDS WITH JOHNSON VICTORY

CHICAGO, Feb. 11.—Fractional strife in the American League vanished early today when after an all night session concessions put forward by B. Ban Johnson and his five "loyal" adherents and the insurgents, presidents Comiskey of the Chicago club, Frazee of Boston and Ruppert of New York were accepted. President Johnson found his authority as league executive altered so far as major disciplinary actions were concerned, an arbitration board—reviewing committee of two members being appointed to investigate all punishments ordered in excess of ten day suspensions and \$100 fines, while on the other hand, it was agreed to dismiss three suits brought against him by the New York club.

With Johnson's victory over the insurgents it was agreed to dismiss three suits pending against the American league president, instituted by the New York club; to reinstate Pitcher Carl Mays of the New York club, whose purchase from the Boston Red Sox last summer started the trouble; to award third place in the American league race to New York and to appoint a commission on arbitration to hold office for two years.

### NATIONAL IS PEACEFUL.


The National league owners at a peaceful session adopted a schedule of 154 games for the 1920 season and accepted the new rules formulated at a meeting of the joint rules committee of the two major leagues.

A meeting of the National Association of Minor leagues drafted legislation to be presented at the joint meeting of major and minor leagues which was expected to be held late today and at which it was hoped an agreement for resumption of relations between the majors and the minors would be reached. Relations were suspended three years ago.

Western league club owners agreed upon a schedule for 1920 but did not formally adopt it. A special meeting will be held in Kansas City, Monday when the schedule will be adopted and other league business, left over from the November meeting, transacted.

The Three-Eye league adopted its schedule late last night and the American Association virtually finished its business yesterday.

## Wayne W. C. T. U. Has \$1,600 to Raise as Quota of National \$1,000,000 Fund; 8 Unions in County

The National W. C. T. U. is now engaged in a campaign to raise a jubilee fund of \$1,000,000. The budget is to be devoted to the education and information, Americanization, women in industry, child welfare, health and morality, and world prohibition divisions. Two new workers are soon to start for China, Miss Christine L. Tinling, and Miss Frances Willard Wang, a Chinese girl, who is a senior at the North Western University. Miss Muriel Ayers, a young woman from New York state is being sent as white ribbon worker to South America.

These three workers, are the first to be supported by the appropriation for world prohibition in the jubilee fund budget. From the money to be devoted to world prohibition the following countries will receive, help this first year: China, India, Japan, South America, Ceylon and Mexico.

Wayne county's apportionment of this jubilee fund is \$1,600, and the eight unions of the county are very anxious, to raise the full amount, or have it pledged by March 20.

### Regional Conference.

The National Woman's Christian Temperance Union will hold five regional conferences in the month of February, the first in New York city, the second in Fort Worth, Texas, the third in San Francisco, Cal., the fourth in Seattle, Wash., and the fifth in Indianapolis, Ind. The Indiana conference will be participated in by women from Michigan, Wisconsin, Minnesota, North and South Dakota, Iowa, Nebraska, Illinois and Indiana.

The Indiana conference will be held at the Claypool hotel, beginning at 10 a.m., on Feb. 25, and closing with the night meeting the 26th. The national director of child welfare work, Mrs. Elizabeth Perkins of Ann Arbor, Mich.; the national director of Americanization work, Mrs. Mary Clark Barnes of New York city; the national superintendent of scientific temperance instruction, Mrs. L. O. Middleton of Kansas City, Mo.; the national director of moral education, Mrs. Gertrude S. Martin of Ithaca, N. Y.; Mrs. Mary Harris Armor, "The Georgia Cyclone;" Miss Anna Gordon, the national president; Mrs. Frances Parks, the national corresponding secretary, will all be present and speak in the conference. It will be presided over by Mrs. Elizabeth Preston Anderson, national recording secretary, of Fargo, N. D.
