

1,510 HOOSIERS GAVE LIVES IN THE WORLD WAR

WASHINGTON, Feb. 11.—Figures by states on casualties suffered during the war among the members of the American expeditionary force as issued Tuesday by the war department show that 1,510 Indiana men made the supreme sacrifice in France during the war.

Only three Indiana officers and fifty-three enlisted men were taken prisoner by the Germans. The total Indiana men wounded was 4,300, and the total Indiana casualties of all sorts was 5,766.

Reigle; stepfather, C. G. Reigle; two sisters, Elizabeth and Pauline Marshall; two brothers, Harry and Ollie Marshall; and one half-sister, Florence Wessell.

The executive committee of the American Legion declared that every former service man and woman is entitled to compensation in the form and amount of one \$50 bond for each month of service and that, with a single exception, legislation to this effect is paramount with congress. The exception is legislation still uncompleted, affecting the rights of widows and orphans of deceased former service men and of disabled ex-service men.

A committee on soldier beneficial legislation which is to meet in Washington on Feb. 16 was instructed to the effect that the enactment of the bonus legislation is a "paramount obligation" on the part of the government with the single exception noted.

A gift of the legion of \$500,000 from the National War Work Council of the Y. M. C. A. was announced at the meeting. This is a surplus left in the Y. M. C. A. treasury after the remittance of the French and American governments of transportation charges for canteen supplies during the war. The money will be held as a trust fund, the income to be used "in furtherance of activities for the benefit of former service men." A letter accompanying the gift from William Sloane, chairman, and John R. Mott, general secretary of the council, made this suggestion.

Considerable time was devoted by the committee to a discussion of the affairs of the American Legion Weekly, the publication of the national organization. Although a suspension of the present publication was decided upon after the issue of Feb. 13, 1920, a magazine in another form will be issued thereafter, for it was decided that such a publication is not inconsistent with the financial resources of the legion. BANKS MAY LIST LIBERTIES AT PAR

National Banks of the city and county have received letters from the comptroller of currency, authorizing the listing of Liberty bonds among their assets at the purchase price instead of the current market value. It was learned Wednesday. The ruling means that bonds purchased by the banks during the original selling campaigns can be listed at par but those purchased by the bank at discounts must be carried on the books as assets at the purchase price.

The letter follows in part: There is no cause for anxiety because of the recent decline in the market value of Liberty bonds. "The fall in price is no reflection upon their intrinsic value and desirability, but the lower quotations offer investors an extraordinary opportunity to obtain at very attractive prices the best security in the world."

HEAVY QUAKE RECORDED.
