**O. C. HUNT**—I am not in favor of the daylight saving plan. Instead of saving time, it wastes the best part of the day for the farmer.

**W. P. HUNNICUTT**—I am opposed to any person or thing telling a lie, and that is what the clock does when you turn it up one hour. City people can just as well go to work at five o'clock. It doesn't save one minute of daylight.

**C. E. HUTSON**—I do not favor this plan. If I hire a hand from the city by the day his time is one hour ahead of ours and he would have to quit work at 5 o'clock by our time.

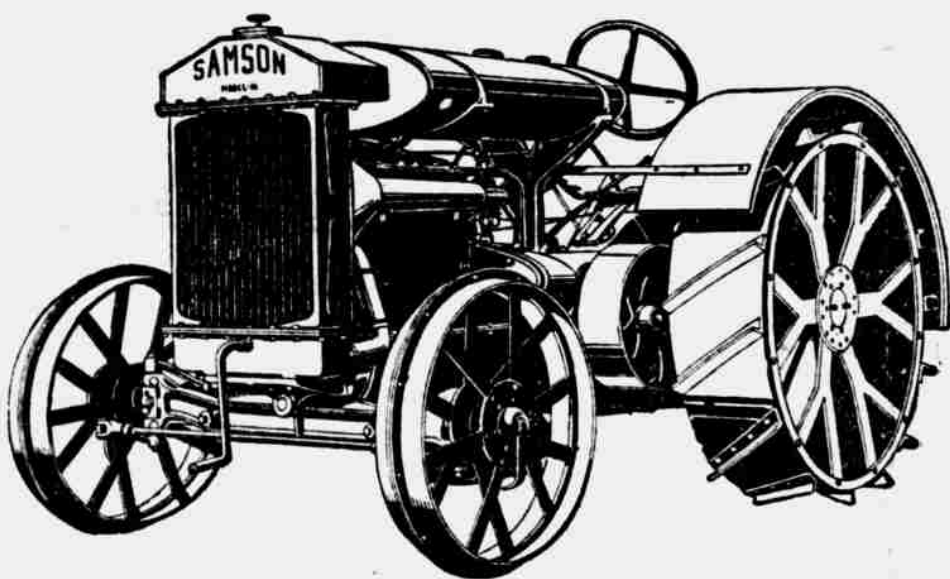

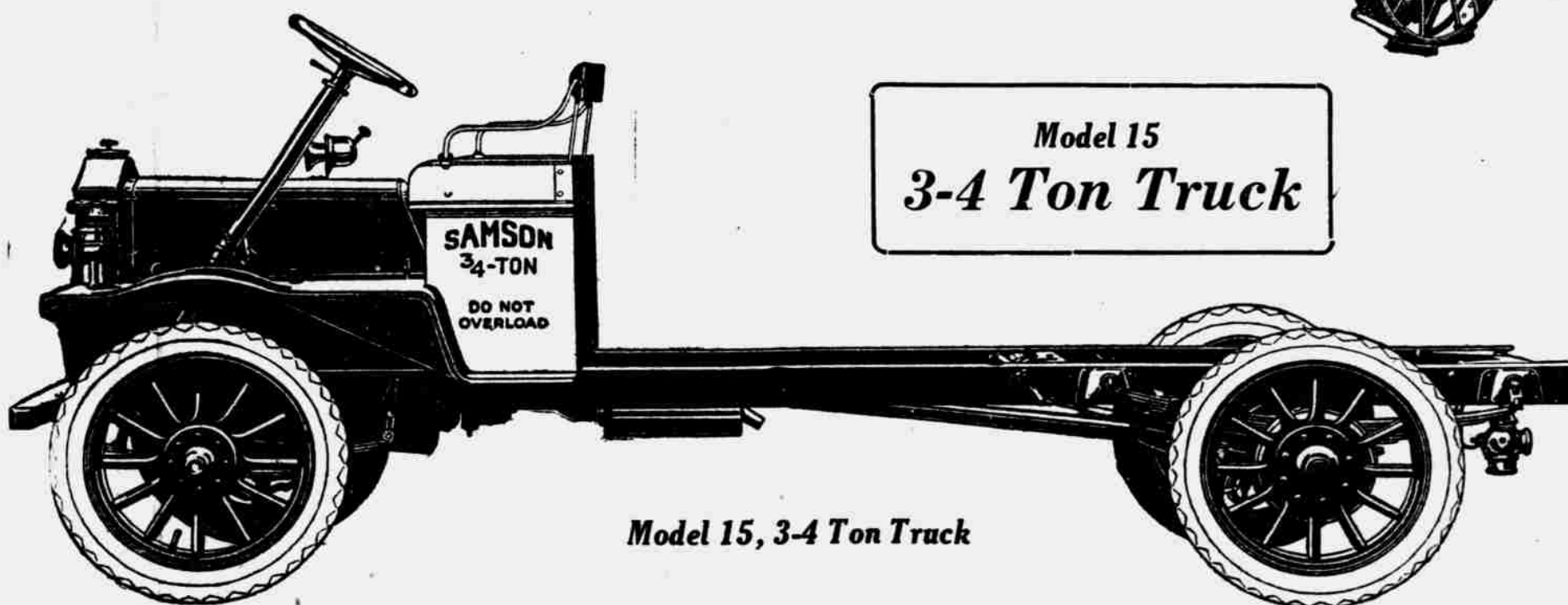

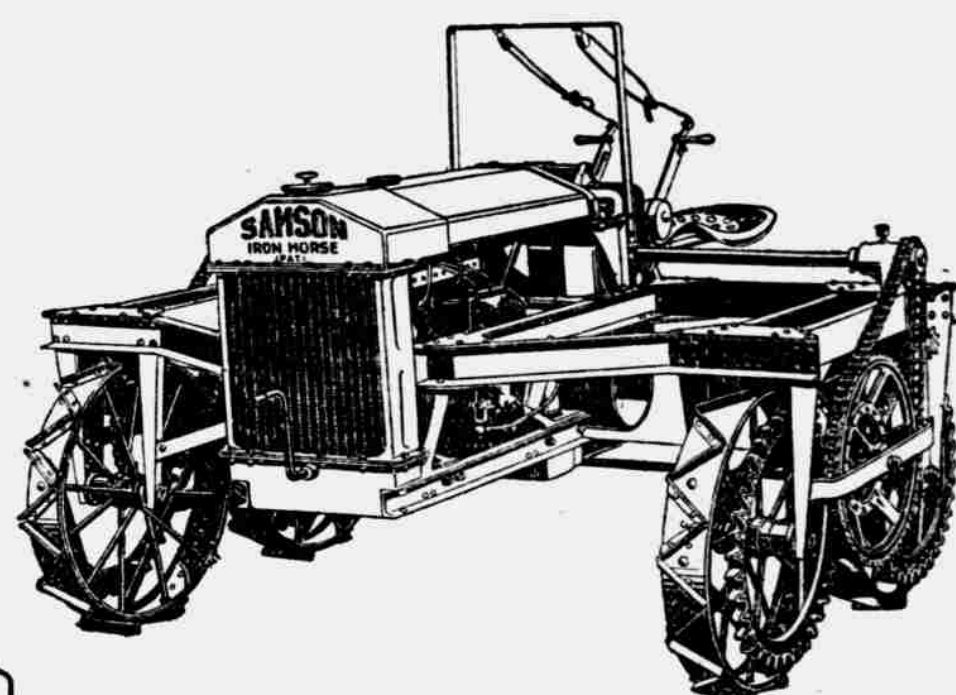
