

LABOR RING WOULD RUN U. S., CHARGE

UTICA, N. Y., Feb. 13. — Charges that behind the announced plan of the American Federation of Labor to obtain the election of a congress and a president favorable to its policies existed a sinister movement of a small coterie of labor leaders, who have grown powerful by the contributions they have levied upon labor, to set up a "government within a government" were made here Thursday night by United States Senator Miles Pollock of Washington in an address before the Utica Republican Club.

"The farmers and laboring men of America," he asserted, "have in every crisis been the great bulwark of our free institutions, and they will not follow the mistaken leadership which would place the government under the despotic control of 'government within the government,' which is not ruled by labor but an autocracy of a few leaders who would not only impose their will upon labor itself, but would extend it, not only by the ballot, but by strikes and starvation of the entire people of the United States. It is as obvious as the 'invisible government' against which the people protested in 1912.

"There is no question of the right of the American Federation of Labor to secure control of congress and of the presidency by way of the ballot box if it can do so in accordance with the proclamation of the nation. It would be an evil day for the United States and most of all for labor itself, if any class in this nation, whether employers or employees in industry, capital or labor, should succeed in any such program; but that is one of the perils which the nation must face as the price of free government."

FAMOUS INN BEING RAZED.
NEW YORK, Feb. 13.—The razing of Bartholdi Inn, an actors' boarding house, which during its 20 years of existence, was the home of many prominent stage and screen stars, before fame and fortune smiled on them, began today. The building, situated at Broadway and 45th street, in the heart of the theatrical district, will be replaced with a motion picture theatre.

Don't Mail Cash Income Tax Payments, Is Warning

Cash payments of income taxes should not be sent by mail, say internal revenue collectors of Indiana. Cash sent by mail is always at the owner's risk of loss; and if lost or stolen, the sender may find himself facing penalties for failure to pay his tax on time.

A taxpayer will find it more practical to buy a post office money order, or draw a check for the amount of the tax, payable to William L. Elder, collector of internal revenue for the Indiana district.

The first payment, due on or before March 15, should be attached securely to the completed return, and forwarded or delivered to branch offices. This first payment must cover either the entire tax shown due or at least one-fourth of the tax due. Early payment and early filing of returns is urged, in order that an overload on the final date, March 15, may be avoided.
