

## EDWARDS ON BODY TO HELP TEACHERS

President David M. Edwards of Earlham has been appointed a member of a committee to assume leadership in the state-wide campaign for the advancement of the teaching profession, announced Thursday by State Superintendent L. N. Himes.

The committee was appointed following a conference of educational and civic leaders of the state, at which the seriousness of the school situation resulting from the shortage of teachers was declared to "threaten the foundations of American institutions."

E. J. Llewellyn, superintendent Newcastle schools, and H. B. Roberts, superintendent Henry county schools, also on the committee. Oscar H. Williams, state supervisor of teacher training, was named secretary.

The conference was called by Mr. Himes to formulate a program for teachers' week, March 7-14, and practically every educational and civic organization of the state was represented.

Dr. W. L. Bryan, president of Indiana university, in addressing the conference, said that "we have got to do something to save the teaching profession." He suggested that the present situation is even more serious than that which faced the schools in 1917 at the beginning of the war. He said that it might be well for the councils of defense to be called back into operation to help get the problem before the people. He urged a campaign for both common and higher education.
