

HOGAN HEAD OF WOOD COMMITTEE

H. G. Hogan, of Fort Wayne, Twelfth district representative on the Republican state committee, will be the Indiana manager of the campaign of Major General Leonard Wood for the Republican nomination for president. He was Twelfth district manager of the primary campaign of Harry S. New for the nomination for United States senator. He has headquarters in the Claypool hotel, Indianapolis.

R. G. Leeds is one of the thirty members of a committee of 30 representative Republicans of Indiana, appointed by E. M. Wasmuth, state chairman, to consider and formulate suggested planks for the Republican party platform.

The committee is to hold several meetings before the state convention in May and is to be the means whereby the people of Indiana may have their views on the party's platform considered and presented as recommendations to the convention for action.

Vice President Marshall, with President Wilson still silent on campaign issues, yesterday ventured to outline his ideas of what the next Democratic national platform should contain. He will go to the convention as a delegate from Indiana and hopes to be a member of the platform committee. His platform views are contained in a letter addressed to his friend, Ed. G. Hoffman of Fort Wayne, the Indiana member of the national committee.

The Vice President hopes that the Democratic party will pledge itself to "the presentation to the people for their suffrage of a man upon an old time Democratic platform, under the principles of which the republic for so many years was contented, prosperous and invincible."

Radical Fired Makes Scene in Oxford Court

OXFORD, O., Feb. 16.—E. Curtis Ilkenhans, of Hamilton, arrested here for distributing Socialistic literature of the most radical kind, was fined \$50 and costs by Mayor Hughes Saturday, the charge being disorderly conduct. Ilkenhans was held twenty-four hours for the government authorities.

Ilkenhans appeared as his own attorney, introducing the story of "Evangeline." He said the wave of reaction which followed the discovery of the necklace in the Magpie's nest, would be duplicated in this country some day, and Socialists would come into its power. When Mayor Hughes pronounced the fine, Ilkenhans sank into a chair wailing, "Believe me, behead me!" A young woman friend paid his fine and secured his release.

The field suffering the greatest loss was the Clinton field, with twelve mines idle and a loss of 14,250 tons.
