STEPHENS FUNERAL
WAITS ARRIVAL OF
RECLUSE'S SISTER

EATON, O., Feb. 19.—It was expected funeral arrangements for De Witt Stephens, 84, recluse, whose dead and frozen body was found Monday morning in a shack in which he lived alone, North Cherry street, would be completed today, following arrival here of his sister, Mrs. Laura Stephenson, of Bluffton, Ind. It is likely the funeral will take place Friday afternoon.

Coroner C. M. Treffinger inclines to the belief that the aged man was stricken with pneumonia and that death resulted from exposure and infection. The body, frozen stiff, was found on the floor, covered over with a mass of old papers. The body was fully clothed. The aged man had a mania for gathering up old papers of every description, which he stored in his shack. The accumulation of papers had grown so large that there was small space in the shack to move around in. A mass of papers was the only covering of his bed.

Stephens has been a familiar figure in Eaton the last 30 or 40 years. Although a man of more than ordinary intelligence, he had for many years past been regarded generally as very eccentric. It is said he was a cousin of Governor William D. Stephens, of California.

Although amply able to surround himself with the comforts of life, the old man lived in a miserly manner. Provisions in his place of abode were scant at the time his dead body was found. It was learned that he owned two rental properties in Anderson, Ind., in addition to the property in which he lived, and about 11 acres of land in the vicinity of Stony Point, southwest of Eaton. On his person was found about three dollars and a check for \$27.50 from Anderson, Ind., in payment for rent.

While it is not definitely known, it is thought the old man's dead body had lain in the shack for two weeks or longer before discovery. Neighbors had not seen him for some time. They say he had talked about going to Bluffton, Ind., to see his sister, and they thought probably he had gone there. When a letter from the sister came Wednesday addressed to the postmaster here, inquiring about the aged man, as she had not heard from him, an investigation was started.

Leonard Deem, mail carrier, found the dead body after he had been instructed to visit the old man's shack and see if he was there, of if the neighbors knew anything of his whereabouts. The aged man never had mail delivered at his home, he always calling at the postoffice for it.

Tarks Pazzled Over
Meaning of "Mandate"

CONSTANTINOPLE, Feb. 19.—Turks living in Anatolia are greatly puzzled by the word "mandate" as applied to the future government of their country. The word is very similar to the Turkish word meaning "buffalo," and therefore confusion reigns in the minds of the Anatolians as to the real significance of this term, which has come into the popular speech since convening of the League of Nations was framed. This curious fact was the subject of remark today by Reour Bey, Turkish nationalist leader and former minister of Marine.

Reour Bey confessed he, himself, was somewhat hazy as to the exact meaning of the word "Mandate" and "mandatories." "Seriously," he said, "I do not know what a 'mandate' means for it is so nebulous and has been defined so differently by various powers. Moreover, as the league of nations has not yet been organized, it is impossible to discuss 'mandates' and 'mandatories' intelligently."

Sweden's Entry Into
League To Be Discussed

STOCKHOLM, Feb. 19.—Proposals that Sweden join the league of nations which have been submitted to the Riksdag government, which has sent with its proposals a document stating arguments for and against such a step. These include apprehensions caused by the failure of the United States to ratify the treaty of peace, but hopes are expressed that this will soon be done at Washington. Sweden's position, it is declared, is based on consideration of her urgent duty to the civilized world, to attempt to prevent future wars, and it is asserted "Sweden risks less being inside the league than outside."

CZECHS GET CREDIT
TO PURCHASE COTTON

LAFAYETTE—The epidemic of influenza and pneumonia in Tippecanoe County is continuing unabated and nine deaths were recorded in the past 24 hours, making a total of 27 since last Saturday.

COLUMBUS—Henry Weldon Lambert, 84 years old, a wealthy farmer and one of the most prominent men in this section, is dead at his home near here. He was a pioneer resident of Bartholomew county.

SOUTH BEND—South Bend is in great danger of being swept off the map if a great fire should break out during the summer months when the domestic and industrial consumption is more than equal to the 2 pumping stations, said William A. Artzingsall, Chicago hydraulic engineer, in a statement to the city council in which he recommended an expenditure of \$400,000 to better the conditions.
