Ohio News Flashes

EAST LIVERPOOL—Burned to a crisp, the body of Mrs. Christine Swearingen, 80 years old, an invalid, was found in her room at the home of Robert Fadely, near here.

MARTIN'S FERRY—Edward Lee, 8 years old, died here as a result of a fractured skull.

SPRINGFIELD—Passengers arriving here Thursday morning reported that they had been robbed of jewelry and other valuables while they were asleep. The loot will amount to \$2,000.

CLEVELAND—A masked bandit, armed with a sawed off baseball bat, held up John Joseph, a restaurant keeper, and beat him so that he may die. The bandit escaped with \$40.

BRIDEPORTE—Delegates representing 15,000 Eastern Ohio coal miners, in special convention at Bellaire, voted to strike April 1, unless the operators accept their terms.

COLUMBUS—Mrs. Margaret Prevey, of Akron, Ohio, who began a fight in Franklin county courts against extradition to Chicago to answer a charge of being a member of the Communist party, will have to remain in jail.

BLOOMINGTON—Plans are on foot to send the Indiana university band and a company of students from the Reserve Officers Training corps on a recruiting tour for the army.

LAFAYETTE—Through the efforts of the Lafayette authorities the mystery surrounding the \$2,000 for robbery at a local store on Dec. 12, has been cleared, the thief apprehended, and one of the biggest "fences" in the city of Chicago located.

TERRE HAUTE—Fifty-three mines, representing a daily output of 42,455 tons of coal, are idle, due to the lack of sufficient cars in the Terre Haute coal fields.

INDIANAPOLIS—The Indiana Egg and Poultry association will hold its sixth annual convention here, March 2 and 3.

ANDERSON—Ballots cast at the 1919 election in Madison county, which subsequently proved the cause of a month of court litigation in the contest for superior court judge and also in the election fraud cases, were burned by the custodian of the courthouse.

Milk Laws Not Changed, Says Inspector Edwards

J. R. Edwards, city dairy inspector, Friday, listed the dairies serving Richmond which handle raw milk and those which pasteurize the product.

The Fred Blawedel Co., and the Hines Brothers pasteurize, said Edwards, and George Kinsler, Henry Cobb, C. T. Pitts and Owen Caskey handle the raw product, he said. Robert Haas recently sold his raw milk route to Fred Blawedel, he said.

The state board of health has advocated, said Edwards, that pasteurization of milk be required, or that dairies selling raw milk have their cows inspected, but there has been no change in the laws.

Any complaints on local service should be sent to him or telephoned to 1762, he said.
