

WORKMEN CARELESS AFTER WAR, INDUSTRY STATISTICS PROVE

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Feb. 24.—Hoosier workmen grew careless at their tasks following the conclusion of the world war and this carelessness apparently reached its maximum during the hot months of last summer, according to statistics announced today by Thomas Roberts, the member of the industrial board of Indiana, who is in charge of the inspection system.

While complete data is not available for the last three months of 1919, Mr. Roberts said, his information is to the effect that the industrial accident conditions throughout the average industries of the state were bettered appreciably towards the close of 1919.

The board issued a definite warning to all workmen throughout the state, urging them to increase their attention to accident prevention methods and cut down immediately the high accident ratio that prevailed in the months following the signing of the armistice.

Mr. Roberts based his statement today on a series of investigations just completed by the Indiana Manufacturers' Reciprocal Association, among 50,000 Hoosier workmen in the plants of 400 Indiana manufacturers, which are subscribers to the Sherman & Ellis compensation service in Indiana.

Hot Months Full of 'Em.
During the months of July, August and September of last year, the number of accidents to workmen in the 400 Hoosier industrial plants increased 70 per cent. over the number of accidents occurring in the preceding three months, although the total number of employees at work was increased only 6 per cent. above the previous quarter.

The investigations also showed that the "high water mark" of accidents in Indiana industries last summer brought about demoralizing conditions in labor ranks, insofar as accident frequency was concerned, that probably never have been equalled in the history of business in the state.

Mr. Roberts said, however: Figures show that during the last three months of 1919 there was a noticeable trend back to the normal accident frequency.

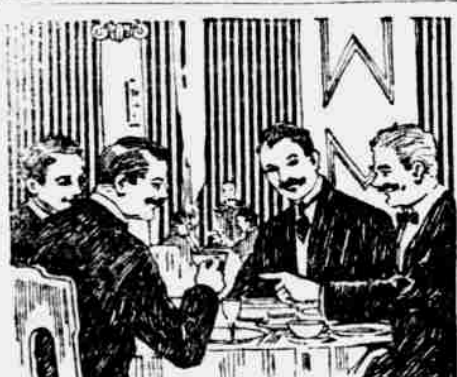
