CHICAGO HOLDS FIRST NON PARTISAN ELECTION (By Associated Press)

CHICAGO, Feb. 24.—Chicago held its first non partisan election of aldermen today, one municipal legislator being voted for by men and women in each of the city's 35 wards. Under the new law a candidate must receive a majority vote and experts predicted the issue in at least 10 wards would have to be decided at a supplemental election April 6. Ten wards had but one candidate each and in seven others it was a two-man fight.

County Death Rate Goes Down, State Figures Show

The death rate for Wayne county for November, 1919, was considerably less than for the same month in 1918, according to statistics just made public by the state board of health.

In November, 1919, there were 48 deaths in the county, as compared with 84 for November, 1918. County deaths in 1919, including November, totaled 648, as compared with 730 for the same length of time in 1918.

The county death rate for November, 1919, was 12.1, while for the same month the year before was 21.1.

Deaths in Richmond alone during November, 1919 were 21, a death rate of 9.9, as compared with 47 the same month in 1918, or a death rate of 22. Total deaths in the city for 1919, through the month of November, were 293, as compared with 359 for the same period in 1918.

Dr. Rae Heads Interchurch and Stewardship Work of County Church Federation

Dr. J. J. Rae, of the First Presbyterian church, was appointed chairman of the Inter-church World Committee of the Church Federation of Wayne county, by the Rev. R. L. Murray, president of the federation, Monday.

Dr. Rae will co-operate with L. W. Carlander in the Inter-Church survey of Richmond, to start on March 14. Word was received by Carlander, Tuesday, assuring him of the presence of the Rev. Trueblood, of Whiting, on March 12, to instruct workers. Dr. Rae will confer with Carlander.

Rae will also head the Stewardship campaign of the Inter-Church Movement of Indiana.
