

**First College Boxing  
Tourney of Ohio Held  
by Miami-Cincinnati**

OXFORD, O. Feb. 25.—So far as known the boxing tournament to be given in Miami University gymnasium on March 27 between Miami University and the University of Cincinnati, will be the first intercollegiate event of the kind ever held in the state. Extensive arrangements are being made for the affair, and a large audience is expected.

Preliminaries, to ascertain who of Miami's fighters will meet the Cincinnati men, will be held March 19, and the finals will be pulled off the following day. Sixty men are at work with the gloves every afternoon.
