

## TAGGART OUT OF SENATORIAL RACE

Thomas Taggart yesterday withdrew his name as a candidate for the Democratic nomination for United States senator and speculation in party circles immediately turned on the probable nominee to be named by the state committee, which under the state election laws, will select the man to head the ticket.

Mr. Taggart's definite refusal to become a candidate, which he had reiterated prior to the filing of his name, came as a distinct blow to the Democratic chieftains who had hoped to see the veteran politician lead the party in the coming campaign.

Mr. Taggart said that the condition of his health made it impossible for him to enter the field again. "Writing this letter is the hardest political task I have ever undertaken," he said in a letter to A. C. Sallee, state chairman, through whom he made known his decision to serve as the senatorial nominee.

"Nothing could give me greater pleasure," he wrote, "than to serve my party in answering this call were it not for the fact that I do not feel physically able to undertake this campaign."

State Committee to Act.  
Mr. Sallee said the state committee would be called in session about April 1, to select a senatorial candidate. Had Fred L. Feick of Garrett, whose name was entered for the Senate by his friends, not withdrawn his name last Friday he would have been the party's nominee without further action, save the ratification by the state convention.

## PEARY WILL GIVE ISLAND TO SON, 16

WASHINGTON, March 10.—The will of Rear Admiral Robert E. Peary, U. S. N., retired, filed Tuesday for probate, directs that all medals, trophies and books and Eagle Island near South Harpswell, Me., be given to his 16-year-old son, Robert E. Peary, Jr. The island, which the will asserts was purchased by the discoverer of the north pole with money earned while a high school student, is to remain permanently in the Peary family.

Mrs. Peary by terms of the will receives for herself and division among the children the residue of the estate, including securities estimated in value at \$300,000, and a group of islands in Casco Bay, Me.

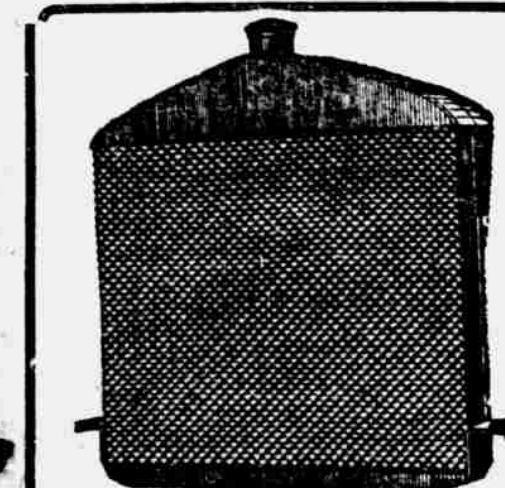

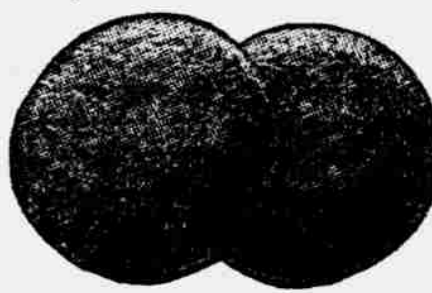

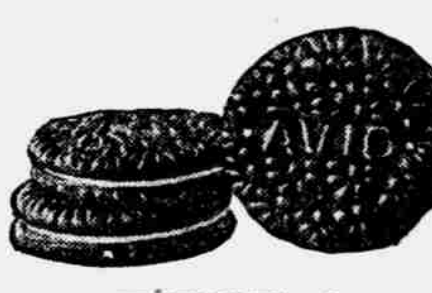
