

I. W. W. WRONG, SAYS FORMER OFFICER

(Chicago News)

The most lively topic in radical labor circles these days is Harold Lord Varney and why he did it. Varney was a 100 per cent I. W. W. secretary of local 800 of the machinery and metal workers' industrial union, a writer of books and pamphlets and one of the chief advisers in matters of propaganda at the national headquarters.

Now Varney has announced in New York city his resignation and issued a long statement explaining why he finds the I. W. W. all wrong.

U. S. Tollers Conservative
"The working class of America is interested in jazz and baseball and Billy Sunday," says Varney's statement. "The working class of America prays to God and venerates the traditions of Washington and Lincoln. The working class owns liberty bonds and votes for the candidates of the great American parties."

"The I. W. W. is a boys' organization. It comes to youth as it came to me—full of the tempest and throbbing of idealism. But when the ideals cool into doubt, the glamour tarnishes."

"A few weeks ago I was holding one of the highest offices in the I. W. W. I sat with Haywood in its national councils. I was the writer and interpreter of the movement. Two of my books were used as textbooks by the organization. I had written a history of the I. W. W. and delivered into every nook and cranny of the I. W. W. incident. I was the foremost lecturer of the I. W. W., traveling constantly to fill ever increasing dates. And just as my boyhood dream of labor leadership began to realize itself, everything began to pale and sicken. The dream tarnished. I had a sense of things falling. My life, crowded and gripped by I. W. W. duties, suddenly became flat and empty."

The first indictment of Varney in connection with I. W. W. activities was returned by a Cook county grand jury in a batch of true bills against
