

NEXT WEEK AT THE THEATERS

WASHINGTON.
The task confronting the producers of the screen version of Augustus Thomas' great play, "The Copperhead," which will be on view at the Washington Theatre next Sunday, Monday and Tuesday, was a considerable one. It involved constructing and twice reconstructing an entire village, the employing, marshalling, costuming, and directing of literally thousands of "extras," and endless research and study of archives pertaining to the periods of the Mexican and Civil Wars. Lionel Barrymore, who was star in the stage play, also is featured in the picture. Charles Maigne was director. The village which was used was constructed on the plains of Long Island and is faithful in every detail in its reproduction of a middle western town in the '50s. It was modelled after original sketches and drawings showing the style of buildings of the period. Every structure was enclosed on all four sides, in itself an innovation in movie making. Over 200 Mexican soldiers, 2,300 Civil War soldiers, and 1,200 Civil War veterans were impersonated by "extras." Different styles of guns had to be obtained for the soldiers in the two wars. An accurate copy of President Lincoln's proclamation of war reproduced by one of the few living men who have seen one.

Who is the most feared man in certain alien sections to-day?
