

WINCHESTER MAN IS ALLEGED TO HAVE PASSED BAD CHECKS

WINCHESTER, Ind., March 16.—Since the disappearance of H. E. Lutz, several days ago, it has been alleged that he had been passing checks on a local bank where he had no funds, and had had them cashed in several of the neighboring towns. Mr. Lutz was working for the Delco Light Company and it is said that H. A. Yost, manager of the Winchester office, was one of the losers. Lutz is said to have come from Columbus, Ohio, where his wife still resides.

SUPERINTENDENT RESIGNS
CONNERSVILLE, Ind., March 17.—Earl Lines, county superintendent of schools, Tuesday filed his resignation with the county board of education, to take effect March 31. He said that his reason for such action was because the present salary, which is ex-

actly \$1.50 per day, is inadequate and that to continue his term, which would not expire for 18 months, would mean a personal sacrifice. The matter of increasing his salary has long been discussed and has been brought before the county commissioners and board of education, but no increase was granted. It is said that no successor is available unless a change of the salary is made.

17,118 SOLDIERS PLACED
According to a statement received by Harry B. Smith, adjutant-general for Indiana, from the service and information branch of the war department, 23,541 former service men in Indiana have applied since the armistice for jobs, and 17,118 of the number have been placed. In the central states of 467,143 who applied for jobs, 340,293 were placed, and in the entire country, 919,754, of 1,299,365 who applied were placed.
