

TAX REDUCTION IS IMPOSSIBLE UNTIL 1922—HOUSTON

WASHINGTON, March 19.—Income and excess profit taxes can not be reduced until after 1922, David F. Houston, secretary of the treasury department, wrote to the House ways and means committee, urging an immediate simplification of these taxes and substitution of a flat tax on excess profits instead of the graduated rates of 20 and 40 per cent.

Only extremely moderate reductions may be made in the calendar year of 1922, collected in 1923, the secretary wrote.

Under the plan of a flat tax, the letter stated, "it would be possible to adopt a declining rate, perhaps of 25 per cent for the first year in which the change is in operation, 20 per cent for the second year, and 15 per cent thereafter."

Unless action is taken at the present session of congress, Mr. Houston said, existing taxes "must continue to be collected on the basis of the present law until the close of the calendar year, 1922."

Such a condition, he wrote, is contemplated with the gravest apprehension.

Losses To Be \$25,000,000

Immediate losses to the Government under the supreme court's decision that stock dividends are not taxable will approximate \$105,000,000, the letter stated.

Secretary Houston added, however, that the ultimate loss would be about \$25,000,000, as much of the original loss would be regained through the sale of stocks and subsequent taxes on them.

MANY TRUSTEES DELINQUENT.

Township trustees and advisory boards who fail to levy sufficient school taxes to run their schools at least 120 days, or when they find the levy insufficient fail to refuse to borrow money sufficient for such purpose, provided that their school corporation is able to borrow money, have not complied with the Indiana rural school law, according to an opinion given to L. N. Hines, state superintendent of public instruction by Elie Stansbury, attorney-general, Thursday. Every Wayne county school has enough funds, but many township schools of the state are being closed.

State Manager Hogan of the Leonard Wood campaign in Indiana, announced today the appointment of Harry Moberly, of Shelbyville, as manager of the Sixth district, with Posey B. Denning, of Rushville, as associate manager.

HARRISON ON "Y" BOARD

A. Bradford Harrison, superintendent of the First Christian church Sunday school, has been elected to fill the unexpired term of K. A. Kenny on the board of directors of the Richmond Y. M. C. A. He was also elected recording secretary of the board. Kenny was forced to resign because of a change of residence to Peru, Ind.

EMBARGO MAY LIFT

Hopes that the embargo on freight to Chicago would be partially lifted within the next few days, was expressed by Richmond express officials Friday. This embargo has been in effect for two weeks, caused by

general strike of express freight handlers at Chicago.

TO CHOOSE REPRESENTATIVES

Representatives of the four colored churches of Richmond will meet in the Y. M. C. A. at 7:30 p. m. Friday to select four representatives from among older Christian colored boys of Richmond to attend the older colored boys' conference in the Indianapolis colored Y. M. C. A. on April 2, 3 and 4.

Fourteen out of the 19 districts which Richmond was divided for the Inter-church survey, may be completed by Monday. Intensive work in the remaining five will be inaugurated the following Sunday.


