

OHIO ELECTRIC CO. TO BE OPERATED BY UTILITY MANAGERS

F. A. Healy, secretary and treasurer of the Ohio Electric Railway company, which operates lines into Richmond, announced at the Springfield headquarters Friday that Charles Day and John E. Zimmerman, of Philadelphia, public utility engineers, will become managers of the lines April 1. He said the engineers will manage the property for the bankers, Drexel and company, and the Bondholders' Protective committee.

According to Mr. Healy no change will be made in the personnel of officers and employees of the company, and all business of the organization will be conducted under the present name of the company, and the system will be governed by the present staff. H. Gordon Gilpin is to remain as general manager and Mr. Healy as secretary.

The Ohio Electric, it is understood, has defaulted in paying its rents to other interests for the use of the Ft. Wayne line and other branches of its

system. Mr. Healy said that the bankers, Drexel and company, and Bondholders' Protective committee have agreed with President Kelsey Schoepf that the company should be turned over to Messrs. Day and Zimmerman to be managed by them as the bankers' representatives.

Gives Up Active Management
Mr. Schoepf agreed to give up the active management of the system rather than have the Philadelphia financiers foreclose their liens on the properties of the company. These liens are in the nature of stock which the bankers hold as security for bonds taken in return for loans to the company. Many of these bonds were given by the company at the time it extended its system.

Mr. Healy said it should be understood that all of the 2,500 employees of the entire system will be retained.


The reason for the bad financial condition of the company, Mr. Healy said, is the increased cost of operating the road in comparison with increases in revenue. This he said, is due to the high cost of labor, the taxes which the company is forced to pay on its holdings and the vast amount of street paving which the company has been forced to do to keep pace with improvements in Springfield and other cities.
