

LABOR'S GUNS ARE TURNED ON CUMMINS

(By Associated Press)

WASHINGTON, March 22—Senator Cummins, Republican of Iowa, is one of the members of congress organized labor will attempt to defeat in November, according to L. E. Sheppard, acting president of the Order of Railway Conductors, who is in Washington today attending the railroad wage conference. Senator Cummins was the author of the anti-strike provision of the railroad, which was thrown out in conference.

Mr. Sheppard indicated that union officials were carefully studying the record of every member of congress with respect to his stand on this provision and other labor matters, with a view to opposing in the elections those regarded as inimical to organized labor.

The headquarters of the railway conductors is at Cedar Rapids, Iowa, and it is said that this union will organize the fight against Senator Cummins.

Mr. Sheppard said, however, that union labor had not yet decided on a candidate to oppose Senator Cummins, whose term will expire next March.



Turn That Vacant Lot Into A Producing Garden!

Vacant city lots would not be of much value for growing corn or wheat, but these valuable pieces of dirt are often just the place for growing a good vegetable garden.

Often the soil is rough and covered with stones and all sorts of waste materials, but most people who live in cities and towns do not get enough outdoor exercise anyway, and the labor necessary to clean off the trash and pile the stones to one side will do them good.

Some of the best home gardens have been grown on vacant lots that were not much more than a stone pile to begin with. In one case enough old foundation stones were removed to build a wall along the two exposed sides of the lot. The soil was then leveled and a few small loads of manure spaded into it.

The garden was planted while neighboring apartment-house dwellers looked on from their windows, doubt written on every face, but the garden grew and flourished, and many were the smiles of appreciation of the good things that were handed them by the owner of the garden.

If the land is not shaded too great a part of the time, almost any vacant lot can be turned into a food garden, but it is often necessary, pretty nearly, to "make" the soil.

GAS PRODUCER OF CONCRETE

Owing to the high price and scarcity of steel during the war, a gas company in Syracuse found it necessary to build the shells of a 200-horse power gas producer and scrubber out of concrete staves. The shells are eight feet in diameter and the staves meas-

ure 24 by 10 by 2½ inches. They are connected by tongue and groove joints. Between the concrete and the fire brick lining there is a three-inch space filled with a heat resisting material.
