

NEW GARDEN SENT MANY TO COLORS; 1 GOLD-STAR MAN

L. O. Anderson collected the following data on the war records of New Garden township service men. Because of the large number of men who sent in no data, the war history committee urgently requests that this be submitted. Harry William Harvey is a gold star man, but nothing more is known of him.

Herschel Morrell Little entered the navy as apprentice seaman Sept. 15, 1910; was in the naval service for five years prior to declaration; assigned to U. S. S. Lemson and U. S. S. Monaghan, torpedo boat destroyers; submarine convoy duty off the coasts of Ireland, England and France; discharged Nov. 1, 1919, chief commissary steward.

Harry Bond entered the service Aug. 2, 1917, and was assigned to medical branch, 150th Ambulance company, 113th Sanitary Train, 38th Division, National Guard; embarked for Hoboken Oct. 8, 1918, and arrived in Liverpool, England, Oct. 17, 1918; discharged July 28, 1919, as cook.

Was in Medical Corps

Harry Hollen Pendleton entered the service March 4, 1918, and was assigned to Field Hospital No. 6, Medical Corps, Regular Army; embarked from Hoboken, N. J., June 8, 1918, and arrived at Liverpool, England, June 15, 1918; sailed for United States June 10, 1919, and landed in Hoboken June 18, 1919; discharged June 25, 1919.

Howard Frederick Meyers entered the Army April 5, 1918, and was assigned to 16th Company, Jefferson Barracks, Mo., Medical Corps, Regular Army; embarked from Long Island, N. Y., Oct. 12, 1918, and arrived in Liverpool, England, Oct. 26, 1918; trained in France; landed back in United States June 2, 1919, and discharged June 12, 1919.

Ralph Chenoweth Reynolds entered the service Sept. 1, 1917, and was assigned to Company D, 309th Engineer, 84th Division, Engineers, National Army; embarked from New York, Sept. 9, 1918, and arrived at Glasgow, Scotland, Sept. 21, 1918; arrived back in United States July 1, 1919, and discharged July 9, 1919, as sergeant.

Fought With 6th Division

Howard McClelland Hocket entered the service as private May 1, 1918, and was assigned to Company L, Sixth Division, Infantry; embarked from Hoboken, N. J., July 5, 1918, and arrived in Liverpool, England July 17, 1918; in battles of the Vosges sector (trenches), Meuse, Argonne; arrived back in the United States June 12, 1919, and discharged June 20, 1919; sergeant.

Roswell Bogue Huff entered the army August 2, 1917 and was assigned to Ambulance company, 113th Sanitary train, 38th division; embarked from Hoboken, N. J., Oct. 6, 1918; arrived in Liverpool, England, Oct. 17, 1918; sailed for United States April 20, 1919, landing in Hoboken, N. J., April 29, 1919; discharged June 3, 1919.

Russell Abraham Kensey entered the service Oct. 27, 1917, as wagoner, and was assigned to Battalion E 57th regiment, first division, artillery, regular army; arrived at Brest, France, May 23, 1918; battles: St. Mihiel, at Montzville, Avranches and Montfaucon, Epenoville and Romagne at Argonne Forest; sailed for United States Jan. 2, 1919, arriving in Hoboken, N. J., Jan. 14, 1919; discharged Jan. 29, 1919, wagoner.

Lawrence Virgil White entered the service March 9, 1918, and was assigned to Aviation branch, Signal corps; on March 15, 1918, was transferred to Observation Balloon school and then assigned to 38th Balloon

company; discharged Jan. 24, 1919, corporal.

Clarence Allen Brinkley entered the service March 6, 1918, and assigned to Aero Squadron, 195th company; discharged July 3, 1919.

Harold Hobart Brinkley entered the army September 5th, 1918 and assigned to 38th Company, 12th Battalion, 159th Depot brigade; discharged Dec. 21, 1918.

Was Second Lieutenant

Thomas Carlton Elliott entered Officers' Training Camp at Ft. Benjamin Harrison, Indiana, May 12, 1917, and commissioned as second lieutenant; assigned to Supply company, 301st cavalry; discharged Dec. 5, 1918, second lieutenant.
