EATON, O., March 26.—Contestants in the county boys' and girls' calf club contest, to be staged at the county fair this fall, will meet here Saturday, at which time the animals will be distributed.

The boys and girls will meet at the courthouse at 10 o'clock in the morning, when each will arrange for payment of his or her animal. A group photograph will be made of the contestants, after which they will have their dinner.

The club members will march to the fairground at one o'clock, where the animals will be distributed. The young steers have been received here and have been placed on pasture in the fairgrounds. They number forty or more.
