A PLAGUE ON BOTH HOUSES, SAYS LABOR

Opinion condemning Republican and Democratic candidates in the county was expressed by members of the Central Labor council, in session Thursday night.

Candidates from either party have little or no interest in labor, said the men, who expressed themselves in favor of a non-partisan party, as advocated by the American Federation of Labor.

The committee appointed recently to interview candidates and secure their stand on matters, relative to the union men, did not report, saying they had not completed their investigation.

The stand taken by the A. F. of L. president, Samuel Gompers, to blacklist only the authors of the bills in congress injurious to labor, was not

strong enough, council members said, and they advocated blacklisting all congressmen who voted for these bills. No definite action was taken.


