

FOUR RICHMOND MEN HEAD COUNTY BLOCKS IN CHURCH DRIVE

Four Richmond men were appointed leaders for the four county conference tours of workers for the Inter-church World Movement on April 6, 7, 8 and 9, at a meeting held in Indianapolis Thursday. Five were present, but one was assigned as a worker.

Thursday's conference was attended by men and women church workers from every county of the state, who received instructions in management and methods for the tour. The state was divided into 24 districts, five workers to each district. Four counties usually composed one district, but this number was reduced in the larger centers. Five counties composed a district in the smaller section.

The Rev. J. J. Rae was named leader for this section, which includes Wayne, Union, Fayette and Franklin counties. The Rev. R. L. Murray and Miss Blanche Scott were named as workers.

Three conferences will be held in each county in morning, afternoon and evening sessions. Richmond, Liberty, Connersville and Brookville will be visited in the order named.

Woodman Heads Muncie District.
The Rev. Charles M. Woodman, of the West Richmond Friends church, was named leader for a district that composes Randolph, Delaware, Madison and Grant counties. This district will have the honor of opening the first session will be held in Anderson on April 1.

The second session will be held at Winchester on April 6. Members of the Rev. Woodman's team will be men of the counties mentioned.

Dr. Lew C. Pennington was named leader of a district that comprises Carroll, Clinton, Howard and Tipton counties. The first session will be held at Delphi on April 6. B. Willis Beede heads the team that will tour Dearborn, Rush, Hancock and Henry counties.

Confederate Veterans Show Bravery as Home Is Burned to Ground

LOUISVILLE, Ky., March 26.—A rebel battle yell, sounded throughout the Confederate home at Pewee Valley, Ky., 18 miles from Louisville, at 6 o'clock last night was the first alarm of a fire that three hours later had destroyed the institution.

Commanded by Sergeant Gus Head, who during the war was keeper of John Morgan's mount, the 100 veterans of the home able to walk, fled from the building with precision similar to that which made the army of the confederacy famous.

Calmy 100 grays marched, at double quick, to the hospital building, made litters of the cots and carried 50 invalid comrades to safety in the little stone church nearby. Many of the latter, however, became excited and are not expected to survive the shock.
