

## PREBLE BOOZE RAID PROVES FRUITLESS; PRISONERS RELEASED

EATON, Ohio, March 27.—Preble county's first liquor raid since national prohibition became effective, staged Thursday evening by federal and county officials, burst like a soap bubble when late Friday afternoon those caught in the raid were released from the county jail here. Sheriff George Jones released the two prisoners upon advices received from two federal agents in Dayton, who stated the action was taken upon advice of the district federal attorney. John Thib and Mary Disch were the prisoners released. They were lodged in jail here early Friday morning, after the raiding party had found about 200 gallons of raisin mash, two bushels of raisins and about 10 gallons of "raisin jack" in a house they were occupying in Gratis township, about nine miles southeast of here. Falling to unearth a still, it is said the officers remained in the house with the prisoners all Thursday night, in hopes of capturing a third person who it was thought would show up during the night with a still. The night's vigil was fruitless.

No explanation of the grounds on which the case was abruptly terminated was contained in the orders received by Sheriff Jones for release of the prisoners.

Thib and the woman returned to their home soon after being given their freedom.

Local officers incline to the belief that a portable still is used in making the rounds of several places similar to the one raided Thursday.

### Freed of Cruelty Charge.
