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## Jews, Soldiers May Come for Passover

That furloughs covering the first two days of Passover will be granted to all men of Jewish faith in the naval and military services is the announcement just made by Colonel Harry Cutler, chairman of the Jewish welfare board. Matzos (unleavened bread) and Hagadahs (Passover prayer books) will be distributed by the Jewish welfare board to every man of the Jewish faith in the service, and through the assistance of the community branches of the board, men who are unable to go home for the Passover celebration will be welcomed in the homes of Jewish families in the communities adjacent to camps and naval stations.

The Feast of the Passover, which this year comes April 3 to April 10, inclusive, commences on the evening of April 2 and lasts eight days with the Orthodox Jews, as against seven among Reform Jews. The first two days are observed as high holy days, and at Seder services in the evening

Seder Nights Celebrated. Passover is chiefly a home festival and therefore the most important of the services incident thereto are celebrated in the home by praise and worship and festive dinners.

Falling in the springtime of the year, this festival was utilized by the synagogue as a means of consecrating the Jewish home to God as the Redeemer and Protector of Israel. The story of the deliverance from slavery was the occasion for voicing confidence in the future redemption from oppression and woe. The Passover feast endowed the Jew ever anew with endurance during the dark night of medieval bigotry and with faith in the "Keeper of Israel," who slumbereth not nor sleepeth. Exultation over Israel's glorious redemption, holding out the promise of a greater day of liberty to those who still chafe under the yoke of oppression.

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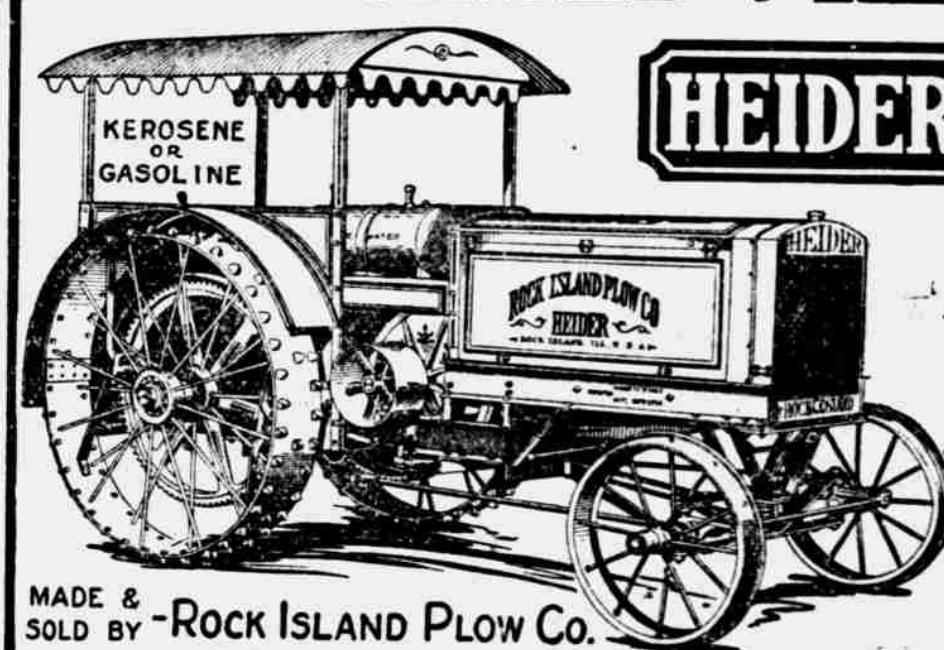
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
