## GRAIN PRICES

CHICAGO, April 1.—Markets strong on wet weather. Signs of five million winter wheat acreage abandoned, rise of two to seven cents in cash wheat, bullish talk on rye, reports of very small corn belt offering. Cash corn and oats one to two cents higher. The strong close for March corn, \$1.67, carried some effect, men from the corn belt say corn is the cheapest raw product even at this advance. Failure of the market to develop liberal dips is a feature. Board of Trade closes tomorrow, April 2. Of the nineteen million rye visible, about seven and one-half million are at Duluth and Duluth claims all of this is sold. There is about one-half million at Minneapolis. The chance of a five million acre ploughup of winter wheat is considered large. Last year's ploughup ran three million acres.
