

G. O. P. TRYING TO COMPLETE LIST OF MEN TO BE HERE

With two presidential candidates already agreed to attend the Republican rally on April 20, members of the committee in charge of the rally are working to bring General Leonard Wood and Senator Hiram Johnson to the city and complete the list of candidates for the Republican nomination for the rally day program.

Word was received from General Wood's Indiana manager Thursday morning that that candidate would be in Ohio during the week of April 19, and that there was some doubt as to whether he could be brought here on April 20.

His manager said, however, that he would try to get the candidate here for at least a part of the day, and there is some chance that he may be able to come here for an afternoon address.

No word has been received from Senator Johnson's manager, other than that every effort would be made to bring him here.
