

SOUTHWESTERN OHIO WOMEN CONVENE AT EATON FOR MEETING

EATON, O., April 9.—Annual conference of the Southwest Ohio District Federation of Women's Clubs opened here this afternoon and will continue over Saturday afternoon. The Preble County Federation of Women's Clubs is entertaining the meeting.

The conference opened at 2 p. m. today with Mrs. George D. Antrim, Dayton, vice-president of the Southwest district, presiding. The session was taken up with conferences on art, civics and music, with Mrs. John McKee of Springfield conducting the art section, Mrs. Elmer Lawrence, Cincinnati, the civics section, and Mrs. Ralph A. Herbruck, Dayton, the music section. The meeting is being held in the auditorium in the courthouse.

An elaborate musical program and a reception for state and district officers and delegates will feature a session this evening. The musical feature is scheduled for 8 p. m., the reception to follow in the lobby of the courthouse, which has been decorated and arranged for the affair.

The program of music will conclude with an address, "My People," by Mrs. Anton Kruchko, Hungarian interpreter, of Dayton.

Mrs. William Sharp, Columbus, president of the Ohio Federation of Women's Clubs, is a prominent figure in the conference. She will deliver an address Saturday afternoon. J. E. Shultz, welfare department, N. C. R., Dayton, also will speak at this session. A luncheon will be given at noon in the Pythian temple.

Saturday morning's session will be devoted to a program of addresses, among which will be an address of welcome by Mayor Harry L. Risinger.
