## CHURCH PROPERTY HELD TAXABLE WHEN RENTED

Church real estate which is being rented is not subject to exemption from taxation, Ele Stanbury, attorney general, held in an opinion submitted Saturday to the state board of tax commissioners. The attorney general was advised that the First Baptist church of Evansville owned real estate which it was renting for residence purposes. "Statutes exempting property are required to be construed against the right of exemption and where a church received rent for real estate rented by it such property is subject to taxation just the same as it would be if owned by an individual," the opinion said.




