

GARDNER FUNERAL HELD; SURVIVED BY RICHMOND RELATIVE

EATON, O., April 12.—Funeral services for Walter Gardner, 31, farmer, who lost his life Friday as the result of a corn shredder accident, were held this afternoon in Ware's chapel, ten miles north of Eaton, after which the body was taken to Camden for burial. The funeral service was largely attended.

The accident resulting in Gardner's death happened on the farm of Mrs. Cora Stambach, near Gettysburg, Jefferson township. He had climbed on top of the machine and in some manner slipped feet-first through an opening into the rolls of the shredder. One leg was severed. He lived only a short time following the accident. He had gone with William Everding's shredding crew to help out for the day.

Gardner lived on the Clem Cooper farm, five miles northwest of Eaton. He is survived by his wife, three sisters, Misses Cora and Virgie Gardner, of Eaton; Miss Mary Gardner, of Winchester, Ind.; one brother, Russell, residing west of Eaton, and two half-brothers, Lester, living near Sugar Valley and Roy, of Richmond, Ind. He was a son of the late Thomas Gardner.

Liberty Loan Bonds Are Exchanged by Holders; No Charge, Emphasized

Holders of third Liberty Loan coupon bonds have started to exchange their temporary certificates into permanent bonds in the Seventh Federal Reserve district, according to the reports of the Federal Reserve Bank of Chicago.

As the returns are beginning to come in the officials of the reserve bank wish to reiterate the statement made in March, when the first exchanges were made, that there is absolutely no charge to the bond holder for the exchange.

"The government makes no charge for the exchange of temporary into permanent bonds," said a Federal Reserve bank official. The temporary ones may be surrendered through banks and trust companies and forwarded by them to the Federal Reserve Bank of Chicago.

The new bonds will be delivered at the expense of the United States. The bank wishes to make this point clear to all holders of Liberty bonds so they will know officially that no bank has the right to charge anything for effecting the exchange.

In this district there is outstanding approximately \$502,000,000 of the third loan bonds, dated May 9, 1918 and maturing September 15, 1928. To this issue there was close to 2,450,000 individual subscribers.

Has Supplies of Bonds. The reserve bank has supplies of the permanent bonds of the first and second fours and first and second four and one-fourth. In round numbers there is \$518,000,000 of these four

In making exchanges on the first and second fours the treasury department has ruled that deliveries of permanent bonds will consist of first and second fours and one-fourth, unless the holder requests otherwise. As there is no advantage in possession of the 4 per cent bonds, it is expected that by making exchanges in this manner they will be practically eliminated from the market.

The first fours represent conversions of the first three and one-half per cent Liberty Loan bonds to the four per cent bonds of the second Liberty loan. The second fours are the original second loan. There is every advantage in converting these to the four and one-fourth per cent bonds of the third Liberty loan, as they retain their original maturity dates.

The first fours have been without an interest coupon since last December; the second fours since November. This interest will be fully adjusted on the exchange into permanent bonds.

CHICAGO U. PLANS STADIUM. What will be the largest and most beautiful stadium in the United States is planned by the University of Chicago. It will seat 90,000 persons when completed, about 25,000 more than the Yale Bowl seats. The Chicago stadium will have an arena 300 by 1,200 feet. It will cost at least \$1,725,000.

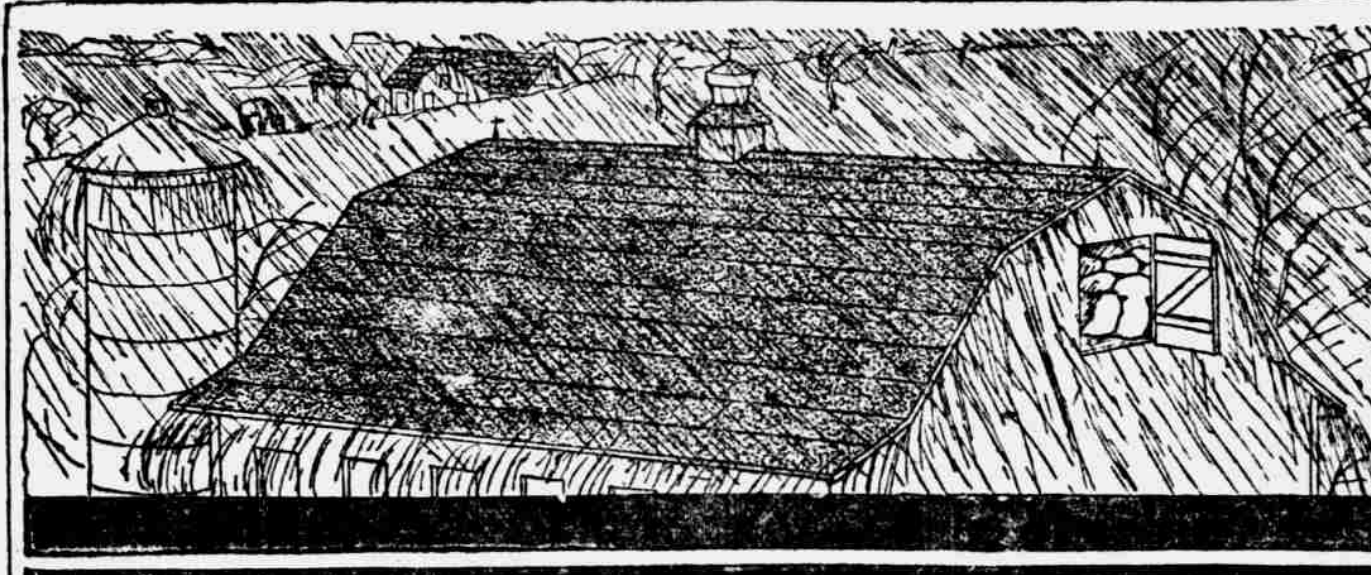
