

TOBACCO EXPORTS INCREASE IN YEAR; GAIN 54 PER CENT

Exports of tobacco products, particularly cigarettes, show a very marked activity at the opening of the current calendar year, according to the latest available government statistics.

Cigarette shipments alone increased \$67,803,000, or 54 per cent, compared with the volume sent abroad in January, 1919. Belgium and Italy took the bulk of the export of cigarettes during January, although nine other important consuming countries were included in the official report.

Cigars and cheroots made a gain for January amounting to \$77,000, or 36 per cent. Plug and smoking tobacco were not so active, however, the former showing a decrease of \$46,571 pounds, or 50 per cent, and the latter a decrease of 256,314 pounds, or 46 per cent.

The total value of all products exported during January, 1920, was \$1,557,387, or 54 per cent higher than the corresponding month last year.

The record for seven months of the current fiscal year reveals the following comparisons in contrast with the corresponding period of the last fiscal year: Cigarettes increased 2,958,382, or 40 per cent; cigars and cheroots increased 17,522,000, or 163 per cent; plug tobacco decreased 1,264,338, or 33 per cent; smoking tobacco decreased 1,122,931 pounds, or 28 per cent; the total value increased \$18,135,450, or 70 per cent.


