CINCINNATI, O., April 15.—The Reds are hard on teams that have been from Chicago and started in where they left off last fall, walloping the Chicago Cubs 7 to 3 Wednesday.

The Reds started the scoring in the first. After Daubert had walked, Groh doubled to left, and both scored when Roush sent one to the center-field wall for a circuit clout.

The Cubs got two on four bingles in the third, and grabbed another in the seventh. Three hits and a base on balls netted the Reds three runs in the seventh.

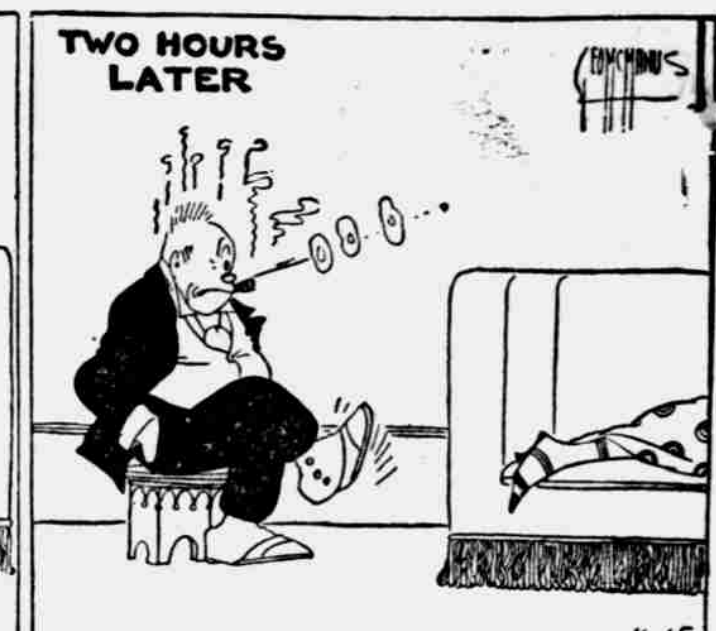
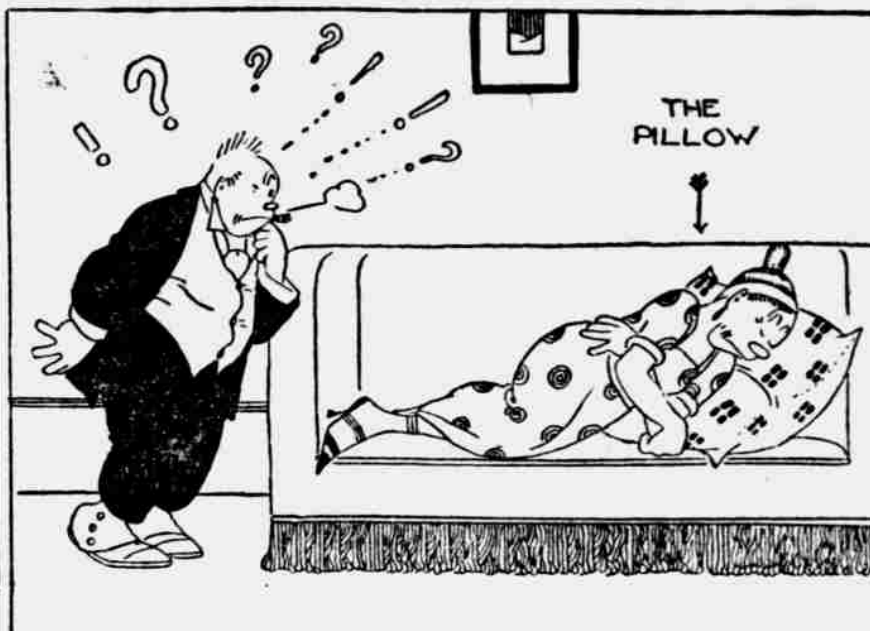
